THE ROSE VALLEY TRAGEDY.

During a considerable term of years this Island Province has enjoyed an exemption from serious crime that has enabled it to take high rank for peace, order and morality in the sisterhood of peaceful Canadian Provinces. This has doubtless been largely due to the character of the sturdy stock by whom the Island was in the first place peopled, their peaceful pursuits, industrious and orderly life and the absence of any recent immigration from abroad. It is in just such a community that the suspicion once aroused of serious crime having been committed, takes the deepest hold and most profoundly moves the public mind.

Such suspicions were aroused recently in the peaceful country settlement bearing the pretty name of Rose Valley. The settlement is typical of many on the Island, made up almost exclusively of people either Scotch or of Scotch descent and of Presbyterian faith and traditions. The community is made up of farmers, each with a well cultivated farm of the usual 100 acres, and a frontage of 10 chains on the great road leading from Charlottetown through Wiltshire, Springton, Rose Valley and on to Bedeque. The farm of Archibald McLeod, the scene of the tragedy, lies almost directly south of Bradalbane station on the P. E. Island Railway, and about three miles distant by the wagon road.

On this 100 acre farm, beside the road is located the Presbyterian Church of which Rev. Mr. Campbell has been the minister for a considerable term of years, and here the devout farmers of the settlement have been accustomed to assemble Sabbath after Sabbath for worship and communion. Here, too, the large family of the late Donald McLeod and his wife were reared and grew to sturdy manhood and womanhood, ten sons and several daughters. And here some five or six years ago occurred the first of two appalling tragedies which have marked the old homestead as a fateful spot. Here Donald McLeod, the father, perished in the well near the farm house, his son Archibald being rescued from the same well at the same time in a nearly drowned condition. And here the aged mother, living with the same son Archibald was found dead in the kitchen on 10th April last.

The circumstances attending Mrs. McLeod's death were felt to be most extraordinary. But the funeral arrangements were made and the body of the deceased lady was consigned to the grave in the usual way amid the sincere sorrow of many who had known and respected her during life. Then the whisper of suspicion grew and was spread abroad that she had met her death by violence. Probably not many actually believed that such had been the case, though some who did not believe still had their fears. Many who perhaps neither believed nor feared that death in this case had been a tragedy still saw and felt that the mystery ought to be cleared and any basis for suspicion swept away. These feelings grew so strong that the authorities were moved to take the extraordinary course of ordering an exhumation of the body and the holding of a coroner's inquest.

All who heard the testimony taken at the inquest or who read the report as published in Thursday's GUARDIAN must have reached the conclusion that an appalling tragedy was enacted at the old homestead on the night of 10th April. The testimony of Dr. Conroy who made the autopsy

seems to almost shut out the possibility of any other conclusion than that which he himself reached. The testimony of other witnesses who heard fearful screams during the night hours in the direction of the house where the maimed and bruised body was found, are by so much confirmatory of the same conclusion. No testimony at all was given that tends to lighten or relieve the gloom which shrouds the awful occurrence of that fateful night. The mystery has been deepened by the inquest and the authorities which have begun the investigation which has resulted in such alarming developments are now doubly bound to find the author of the crime.

Public feeling is now greatly aroused and needs to be calmed rather than to be further excited. All hasty judgments should be set aside, and especially ought we to shrink from a conclusion that would pronounce any man guilty of so awful a crime until so found by a jury of his peers after fair trial. But for the sake of the innocent living who may be most wrongly suspected, and alike for the sake of the poor victim of cruel and murderous crime, something must be promptly done to sift this matter to the bottom. It cannot be permitted that a peaceful and respected member of the community can be strangled in her home and no steps taken to bring the criminal to justice. Somewhere in this fair Island, in secret hiding perhaps, or going abroad among his fellows larks or walks a man whose hands are stained with innocent blood—blood which cries from the ground. Let the officers of justice sleep not in their quest till they have found him and brought him to trial.

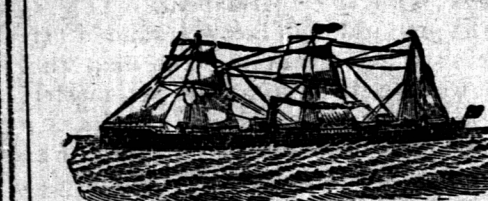
