WALTER JONES HAS GONE TO VIRGINIA

ST JOHN, Sept. 8.—A lucky Prince Edward Islander in the person of Walter Jones, passed through the city on Wednesday on his way to Virginia to take charge of the agricultural department of one of the leading Virginia universities. Mr Jones has just completed a very brilliant course at the Guelph Agricultural College, and is enthusiastic over the outlook for young men in this particular sphere. Mr. Jones says that the Canadian agriculture schools are taking a very high standing as compared with some of the United States colleges. The whole graduating class this year of which Mr Jones was a member, had no difficulty whatever in securing positions on graduation. The average was about twelve hundred dollars to start. One man got as high as seventeen hundred. A position in the college, of five hundred and fifty dollars per year and expenses, was thrown open to any member of the graduating class but none would accept it. The college authorities had no difficulty in getting their pick of one of Western American Colleges for this position at the above salary, thus showing the added advantage of the Guelph graduate. Mr Jones is a native of Pownall, Prince Edward Island, and is a graduate of Acadia University. He is not a novice in the teaching profession, as previous to entering upon his agricultural studies he was principal for a number of years of one of the Consolidated schools in his native Province. He was very well known in the athletic circles throughout the Province.

THE CHARLOTTETOWN DRIVING PARK RACES

Owing to two of the general classes of the races to be held on the Charlottetown Driving Park during Exhibition week not having been filled as was announced in the press, the Directors have decided upon opening a new class. This will be a 2.35 class and pace. The purse will be \$250. The entries close next Wednesday, the 15th inst., with C. R. Smallwood the Secretary. No horse barred by record made after that date. Five or more horses to enter and four or more to start. The general conditions published governing the other regular classes will govern this class except as above. The order of the races subject to conditions will be: 1st DAY, TUESDAY, SEPT. 21. 2.35 Class Trot (Stake). 3 Year Old and Under Trot and Pace (Stake). 2nd DAY, WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 22. 2.35 Class, Trot and Pace. 2.35 Class Trot, 2.28 Class, Pace. 3rd DAY, THURSDAY, SEPT. 23. 2.18 Class, Trot and Pace. 2.50 Class, Trot (Stake). 2.40 Class, Pace (Stake). Three days' good racing should be assured, as all the classes are well filled, except, of course, the 2.35 trot and pace, the entries for which have not closed. Almost all the horses are Island horses, and a magnificent list of them has already been published. It is many years since so many horses have been entered in a class to face the wire, and it is a matter of time since the distance had to be increased as it surely will this year.

TRAIN STRIKES AN AUTO THREE DEAD, ONE DYING

BAY CITY, Mich., Sept. 8.—Three persons were killed, one perhaps fatally injured, and one slightly injured this afternoon when a Michigan Central train struck an auto at the south city limits' crossing. U. S. FLEET HAVE ROUGH TIME

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 8.—With every bone and sinew under strain during a forty miles an hour blow from the north, rear admiral Schroeder's Atlantic battleship fleet of 18 vessels last night safely rode the waves of the Atlantic ocean, 50 miles off the Virginia coast and this morning, under a blue sky, resumed battle practice in severe weather that tossed the O'Brien and Nicholson about like corks on the water. Admiral Schroeder declared that the most successful ever attempted in these waters. The vessels of the torpedo flotilla today took on coal, water and general supplies preparatory to joining the battleships and cruisers on the drill ground. When these boats reach the drill ground admiral Schroeder will have a total of 29 naval vessels under his command. The battleship cruisers and torpedo boats are expected to proceed together on Sept. 21 to New York harbor for the Hudson-Fulton celebration.

THROUGH SERVICE TO BE STARTED SOON

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 8.—A regular train service will be established between Winnipeg and Edmonton on the Grand Trunk Pacific railway in a few days. The ballasting has now been completed into the city and everything is ready for the inauguration of a daily passenger service. An announcement will probably be made immediately upon the arrival in Winnipeg of Charles Rivers-Wilson and party, who left for the east this morning. The track-laying is practically completed as far as Pembina river, and it is expected that grain will be moved over the main line as far west as that point this fall. The steel laying machine will be moved east as soon as the track is laid to Pembina. The whole force will then be transferred to the two branches running out of Melville. The line to Regina will be completed first and the one to Yorkton later. Work on the concrete foundation of the new G. T. P. roundhouse in Edmonton was started yesterday and this building is to be rushed to completion as quickly as possible.

SHOT A WOMAN FOR A BURGLAR

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 8.—Mistaking her for a burglar, William A. Avant, a prominent planter of Georgetown county, shot and instantly killed Mrs C. C. Bigham, who had accompanied her husband, a physician of Harpers, a small town in the same county, on a professional visit to Avant's home, "Sunny Side" plantation, on Murrell's Inlet. Dr Bigham and Mr Avant were sitting on the front porch of Avant's home after supper when they saw in the darkness a figure pass the house and go towards a nearby creek. Not being answered when they hailed, they got a shotgun and followed. They saw the figure apparently crouch near the creek, and hearing no reply when they called, Avant asked Dr Bigham what he should do. "Shoot," said Bigham, it is alleged, and Avant fired both barrels at close range. Running back to the house they secured a light and returned to the creek bank to find Mrs Bigham stretched there dead, the contents of both barrels having taken effect in her back, even the gun wads having penetrated her flesh. Avant carried the news to Georgetown, and accompanied the deputy sheriff and coroner back to Murrell's Inlet.
