## Airborne Troops And Marines Land

ATSUGI AIRFIELD, near Tokyo, Aug. 29 (Thursday)—The two-pronged occupation of Japan began today with the first waves of 7,500 airborne troops landing at Atsugi, 18 miles southwest of Tokyo, and elements of 10,000 marines and sailors landing inside Tokyo Bay at Yokosuka naval base.

Gen. MacArthur's silver transport plane, "Bataan" was over Japan as a procession of hundreds of transports, stretching over the 1,000 miles from Okinawa to Tokyo Bay, landed with split second timing.

## Pacific Force To Be Disbanded

OTTAWA, Aug. 29 (CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight brought his Cabinet up to full strength with the appointment of H. F. G. Bridges, Liberal member of Parliament for York-Sunbury, as Minister of Fisheries and two other shifts.

The two other shifts move Hon. Ernest Bertrand from the Fisheries portfolio to Post Office Department, vacant since the resignation of Hon. W. P. Mulock, and Hon. J. J. McCann, whose War Services Department is to be disbanded, to the National Revenue Department, vacant since the appointment of Hon. D. L. MacLaren as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick.

They referred the order to the Salt Lake Tribune where the statistics department estimated that the 232,000 acre potato crop to 10 per cent may be available some day at about \$12,000 for a half-pound.
