WINNIPEG, Jan. 22 — (CP) — Oats showed independent strength Saturday, in fairly active trade on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, as American houses and shipping interests were steady; buyers throughout the session. All other commodities slipped a little after good openings, as selling came into late trade.

Chicago declines influenced late sales in both rye and barley, which wiped out gains posted earlier, and resulted in losses being recorded for the day.

No export business was reported here, but New York trade reports indicated a shipment of four cargoes of Canadian wheat was marked for Belgium.
