### Guard Against Nazis Dropping From Airplanes

By Godfrey Anderson Associated Press Staff Writer WITH THE ROYAL AIR FORCE IN FRANCE, Nov. 8—(AP)—Even on the most leisurely, unofficial mission, Royal Air Force and Army officers carried arms today as protection against possible attack by German parachute jumpers.

The Weilsian picture of enemy troops jumping from the skies to attack some area behind the British or French lines caused no particular alarm here, but it is nevertheless a possibility which must be considered.

The first object of any parachute attack, it was thought, would be against an army or air force headquarters. Precautions have been taken accordingly.

What these precautions are cannot be revealed, but it is sufficient to say that any attempt by Germans to try this form of warfare, which was attempted in Poland, could easily result in unpleasant surprises for the attackers.

The odds are against a completely successful action by parachute jumpers, according to most R. A. F. officers here.

They say that such an attempt could be made only on a moonlight night to secure prospects of even partial success.

A great number of planes would have to be employed and they would run the risk of being intercepted by Allied fighters before their job was done.

As for the enemy raining from the sky to seize an airfield, all fields have strong machine gun nests, constantly manned.

Military advisers said the aerial invaders would be riddled before they even reached the ground.

### TO SEEK GOLD ON COCOS ISLAND

BALEBA, Calif., Nov. 8—(AP)—The legend of Cocos Island's buried gold lured another expedition southward today, guided by letters a century old.

The 18 square miles of tiny island, in the Pacific off the coast of Costa Rica, are pockmarked with the diggings of a score of other adventurers. All returned empty-handed.

But reports of millions in treasure persist. George L. Bosley, an automobile club official, told of the newest hunt today. He said the sailing schooner Spindrift left Newport Harbor here several days ago with eight men and a woman aboard.

He told this story of the trip's background:— In 1821, the Mary Dear, commanded by a captain Thompson, was anchored at Callao, Peru. Treasure from Lima's Spanish Catholic Church—valued at \$80,000,000 and including two life-sized statues of the Virgin Mary cast in solid gold—was put aboard because church officials feared revolutionists

### Death Calls Belgium Hero

BRUSSELS, Nov. 8—Burgomaster Adolphe Max, 69, one of Belgium's national heroes and mayor of Brussels for 20 consecutive years, died today of pneumonia.

Loved by the Belgians for his defiance of German invaders of his city during the first Great War, he died shortly after Queen Mother Elizabeth visited him. One of the first to call after his death was King Leopold, a close personal friend.

When the German commander, General Von Jartostky, entered Brussels in 1914, he called at the ancient city hall and punctiliously placed his revolver on the desk.

Burgomaster Max thereupon took out his penknife and ceremoniously placed it next to the gun, thus beginning his resistance to the conquerors which culminated in his arrest and detention in a German prison until after the war.

Max escaped from the prison at the time of the armistice with a false passport written by himself and on his return to Brussels was given an ovation by the people. Upon his return to Brussels a street was named for him, he was named minister of state, member of the Royal Belgian Academy and vice president of the Superior Congo Council. The next year he was elected to the House of Representatives.

He declined a title offered by the King and in 1925 refused the premiership.

### British To Take Canadian Lead, Zinc Production

LONDON, Nov. 8—(CP Cable)—The British government today announced plans to take over all Canadian exports of lead and zinc for the duration of the war.

On the basis of 1938 exports this would mean a take over of \$30,000,000, but it was considered here that war needs would result in an increased production and consequent boom of exports.

Last week the British government contracted to take Canada's output of copper over the domestic requirements for the duration of the war. The dominion produces about \$80,000,000 worth of copper a year. Of this amount about \$35,250,000 worth is exported.

No details of today's arrangement were released, but it recalled plans already announced by the ministry to assure large purchases of Australian wool and wheat and South African maize.

It is learned that the bulk of the lead will come from the Trail, B. C. plant of the consolidated Mining and Smelting Company, while the zinc will be supplied by the same company and also by the Hudson Bay Mining and Smelting Company, Limited, Mines at Flin Flon, Man.

Preliminary figures for Canada's lead production in 1938 showed a total of 418,913,287 pounds valued at \$14,008,459. Zinc production was 381,506,588 pounds valued at \$11,723,997.

### Byrd's Ice Jitney Comes To Grief

BOSTON, Nov. 7—(AP)—Admiral Richard E. Byrd estimated tonight that 20 penguins had delayed his departure for Antarctica by approximately one day.

So heavy was the response to his announcement that he wished to place the flightless birds "in good homes" before leaving on a forthcoming South Polar expedition that at his home, his office and the Navy yard dock where the two expedition ships were loading, virtually nothing could be done today except turn applicants away.

This was before it was generally understood Admiral Byrd had placed a valuation of \$150 each upon the penguins.

The articles were buried in Cocos Island, a few years later, an unnamed first mate wrote letters and drew maps detailing the burial and its location. These came into the hands of James Alexander Forbes, a doctor and navigator. They have been in the Forbes family since.

"They appear so authentic," said Bosley, "that we feel certain we are on the right track. They have never been put aboard because they were used as the basis for a search."

### Conservative Platform In N. B. Announced

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 8—Conservative Leader Squires tonight announced a platform of 12 main points, with various sub-sections for his party in the coming campaign to the New Brunswick Elections Nov. 20. If elected, he promised in part, the party would make provision for the administration of the province by the Premier before shipping; co-operate with the Dominion "in respect to such amendments to the B. N. A. Act; overhaul and modernize the system of administration of justice.

Establish separate departments of labor and industry headed by ministers, and place the Tourist Bureau under a Deputy Minister. Abolish the Department of Education, Federal and Municipal relations; federal relations to be administered by the Premier and education and municipal relations to be combined with other departments.

Establish a board of financial experts to investigate the financial situation of the province and advise remedies, with all the financing of New Brunswick bond issues hereafter to be handled through the agency of the Bank of Canada.

"Due regard being had for our provincial autonomy," Request increased grants from the Dominion Government for Social Services. Palling such increases, the Dominion be asked to take over the Social Services.

### Germans Plan Observance Of Cellar Putsch

By Louis F. Lechner Associated Press Staff Writer BERLIN, Nov. 8—(AP)—With quiet prevailing in the war, German attention was diverted to the anniversary celebration of Adolf Hitler's Munich Beer Cellar Putsch of 1923.

It has been traditional for Hitler to speak on the night of each Nov. 8 in Munich's Buergerbrau Hall to the survivors of the old guard who assembled there the night before the unsuccessful march to conquer Germany was staged.

This part of the program is to be retained Wednesday, but the traditional ceremony on Nov. 9, consisting of a parade to the two "temples" containing the remains of the men who fell during the Putsch, has been cancelled.

(The revolt was quashed and Hitler, in April, 1924, was condemned to five years in prison. He was released in December, however.) Orders "treating officers of trusteeship" in Poland were issued today by Field Marshal Hermann Goering of the Council for National Defence, indicating that some form of government for German-occupied Polish territories is being organized.

### Britain To Buy Here Despite Embargo Repeal

OTTAWA, Nov. 8—(CP)—Canadian need have no fear Great Britain will stop purchasing here because of the repeal of the United States Arms Embargo, Sir Gerald Campbell, British High Commissioner, said today as he addressed the annual luncheon of the professional institute of the civil service of Canada.
