ISLAND AIRMAN KILLED.—Miss Louise Hacker, Summerside, received a telegram on Saturday bringing the sad news that her only brother, Cadet James Hacker, had been killed accidentally on Friday, at Desoronto, Ontario, where he had been training in aviation. No particulars were given other than that the sad affair was an accident. The late Cadet Hacker was thirty-two years of age and had enlisted with one of the artillery units in Charlottetown. Later he secured a transfer to the Royal Air Force and had been in training for some weeks before the fatality occurred. He was the only son of the late Mr. Thomas Hacker, Bedeque, and was a splendid type of young manhood. He was a graduate B. S. A., of McDonald College, and only recently received his commission as Lieutenant. He is survived by two sisters, Miss Sadie Hacker, in the employ of Messrs. James Paton & Co., Charlottetown, and Miss Louise of Summerside. The father and mother had predeceased him by several years. The bereaved sisters will have the heartfelt sympathy of a wide circle of friends in the sorrow that has suddenly overtaken them.

KILLED IN ACTION.—His friends will regret to learn that a telegram was received yesterday by Mr. Hooper Horne, announcing the death of Herbert McKie, who was killed in action in France on August 11th. Mr. Herbert McKie was a brother of Mrs. Hooper Horne. He enlisted first with a battalion in Alberta and later with an English Regiment. This brave young soldier who has thus made the supreme sacrifice is another of our Island boys whose grave is now in France.

A PATRIOTIC FAMILY.—Mr. and Mrs. Alex. J. Bahrbick, of Bristol, Lot 40, have given liberally to the cause of liberty as the following will show. They have one son Patrick Francis just returned from France wounded in right leg, left side and gassed. An other son, Joseph, is in France now, and two others Hbbitt and John are in the American army flying corps. Phillip is in the construction work and James and Louis in the American army, present address unknown. Patrick, above referred to, enlisted in Winnipeg, having been turned down at Valcartier with the medical corps and later joined the 34th Fort Garry Horse. This is a family record hard to surpass by any Island family.

PETTY THIEVES.—Petty thieves have been operating on Euston St., during the past few weeks, the vegetable gardens being their special hunting ground. Many of these gardens had been laboriously planned and worked by people who loyally attempted to help out the food situation by growing their own vegetables. The slackers and "no goods" are feeding off them. Although there are strong suspicions the thieves have not yet been sufficiently identified to justify proceedings being taken, but it is understood and hoped that a net is gathering around them that they cannot escape.
