Good Business All Round

MONTREAL, July 2 - Accumulating evidence indicates that the "receding tendencies which had appeared in certain lines" of Canadian business activity during 1948's first quarter "have not proved to be precursors of a general slackening". This appraisal, reported in the Bank of Montreal's latest Business Review, issued today.

"Most indicators of industrial activity are above last year's level," the monthly report comments, adding that there is "exceptional buoyancy evident in the field of new construction."

Elaborating on this, the B. of M. says the value of construction contracts awarded in May, amounting to \$140 million, was "unprecedented" and compared with a previous monthly peak of only \$86 million in June, 1941. Contracts awarded in the first five months of the year ran to \$349 million, or 38 per cent higher than in the same period last year.

U. S. Dollar Situation Better

"Foreign trade figures to date afford evidence of the effect that governmental measures have had toward resolving the problem of Canada's U. S. dollar deficiency," the bank observes.

"In the six months since import restrictions were imposed last November the net excess of merchandise imports from the U. S. A. has amounted to only \$219 million as compared with \$437 million in the same period a year earlier, the review stresses. "It is noteworthy, however, that this reduction of \$218 million in the unfavorable balance is accounted for predominantly by greater exports to the United States, which increased \$158 million, rather than by reduced imports, which fell \$30 million between the two periods."

Commenting on trade with all countries, the review says that "the Government had estimated that the surplus for the full calendar year might be of the order of \$150 million, a favorable balance of \$145 million had already accumulated during the first five months."

Money Values Out-Run Production

The B. of M. points out that "praising statistics of abundance," it is becoming increasingly important to distinguish between those representing physical quantities and those expressed as money values.

"Production in quantitative terms, a real measure of economic growth, is at very high levels but price-time standards but appear to be touching the limits of capacity set by the full employment of human and productive resources under existing working conditions, and is subject always to the variable bounty of nature," the review states. "Thus, continuing increases in dollar aggregates represent largely a marking up of prices of an advance in rates of pay. Indeed, the element of present and possible repercussions of changes in prices and costs."

N. Y. Stock Market Has Recovered From Bad Beating

NEW YORK, July 4 - (AP) - The stock market recovered from one of the worst beatings of the year last week and ended at a general high since August 1946.

Trading activity dropped to a summer tempo, on only one day topping 1,000,000 shares.

Rails and oils carried the ball most of the week.

Nickel Plate Railroad Common was one of the week's high flyers, ending with a net gain of 14 1-2 points at 90.

Nickel Plate has been bolstered by the possibility that the way is being paved for a common stock dividend. Directors plan to clear up arrears on the preferred with cash out of earnings, according to the latest information, and when that has been accomplished a common dividend may be feasible.

Making its second successive Friday-to-Friday decline, the Associated Press composite of 35 wholesale commodity prices stood Friday at 189.79. This compared with 190.81 a week earlier and 178.75 a year ago. In the index the base year 1926 equals 100.

Plan To Modernize Merchant Marine

(By The Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, July 1 - The Canadian Maritime Commission has launched a "tonnage replacement plan" intended to modernize this country's merchant fleet, the organization's annual report disclosed when it was tabled today in the Commons.

The report said that Canada's fleet of 153 ships, totalling 983,000 tons, consists mainly of the war-built "Park" ships, afterwards sold by the Government to private shipping interests.

U. N. May Consider Berlin Situation

LAKE SUCCESS, July 3 - (CP) - An authoritative source said tonight United Nations Secretary-General Trygve Lie is studying the question of putting the Berlin situation before the Security Council.

This source, who would not permit identification, said Lie has on his own initiative made tentative inquiries of some members of the Berlin deadlock.

Lie's office would not comment on the report.

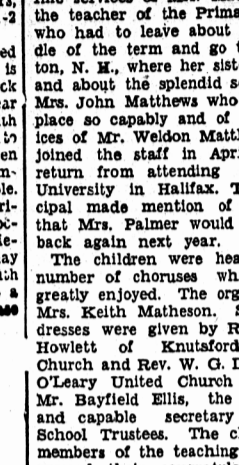

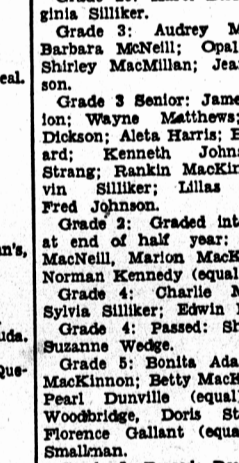
