...ISLANDER WOUNDED—The following is taken from the New Glasgow News of a recent date: The first man wounded, who originally belonged to the Fortieth Battalion, now in training at Valcartier Camp, was heard from today, when the following telegram dated Ottawa, was received by Albert Hicken, Trenton: "Sincerely regret to inform you that No. 15597, Pte. Edward Hicken, 13th, formerly 49th Battalion, officially report admitted to No. 2 Casualty Clearing Station, Sept. 20, gun shot wounds. Will send further particulars when received." (Sgd.) Adj. General. Pte. Hicken was formerly one of the original men with the 40th Battalion squad, who left here with Captain Chisholm and Lieut. Dawson, after getting sufficient training he was taken in a draft to England and had only been on the firing line in France a very few days when he was wounded. He has a brother, Pte. Stewart Hicken, who has been on the firing line now for four or five months, but who has escaped without a scratch so far. His many friends in Trenton and New Glasgow will deeply regret to hear that Pte. Edward Hicken has been wounded and hope for his speedy recovery. (Pte. Hicken was born in Georgetown, P. E. I., and is the son of Mr. Albert Hicken.)

A. for some time in connection with the lumber business, and enjoyed the well-merited confidence of his employers. A few weeks ago he was taken sick with typhoid fever and was taken to the Eastern Maine General Hospital, where he died. His remains were brought home to Charnwood, Souris, his father's residence last Thursday (September 23rd.) and interred the following day. The Rev. E. E. Styles conducted the service. Besides his father there are several near relatives who mourn his decease and to whom our sympathy is extended.

CHICAGO MARKETS

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Wheat No. 2 Red 1.05 to 1.15. No. 3 Red 95 to 1.02. No. 4 Red 88 to 94. No 2 hard 1.05 to 1.15. Corn No. 2 yellow 65 to 66. Oats No. 3 white 34 to 35. Standard 37 to 38. Rye No. 2, 1.00. Barley 52 to 60 Timothy 5.00 to 7.25. Clover 12.50 to 19.00. Pork 13.32. Lard 7.95. Ribs 8.37 to 9.90.

Wheat: Wheat sold locally on farmers' markets over Ontario as follows: Berlin 85c to 90c; Brantford 85c; Coburg 80c to 90c; Kingston \$1 to \$1.20; Owen Sound 80c to 82c and Stratford 85c. At Winnipeg No 1 Northern wheat was quoted yesterday at 91 3/4c per bushel. In two days 3,358 cars were inspected in Winnipeg and No. 2 wheat sold on the cash market at 89 3/4c per bushel. Oats: New oats are selling in Toronto at 41c to 45c per bushel. At lake ports, Ontario oats are 38c to 39c per bushel. Millfeeds: Millfeeds at Toronto are down another \$1 below last week's prices, as follows: Bran, \$24 per ton; Shorts, \$26 and Middlings, \$27 per ton. At Montreal prices remained unchanged, Bran selling at \$26 per ton; Shorts \$27 and Middlings \$32 to \$33 per ton.

Hay: Hay sold at local points in Ontario as follows: Berlin, baled, \$18 to \$19; loose \$16.50 to \$17.50; Owen Sound, baled, \$18 loose \$13 to \$13.50; Peterboro, baled, \$18; loose \$16 to \$18. At Montreal this week prices are unchanged. Live Stock: At the Montreal stock yards the receipts of live stock for the week ending Sept. 25 were 2000 cattle, 5,900 sheep and lambs, 2,600 hogs and 900 calves. Owing to the fact that there was no demand for cattle for export a weaker feeling developed in the market and prices for all grades scored a further decline of 25 cents per cwt. as compared with prices paid a week ago.

Sheep and Lambs: A better feeling entered the sheep and lamb market today and yesterday. There was a good demand for large lots being taken freely. Lambs went at \$8 to \$8.75 for best and \$7 to \$7.50 for culls. Heavy sheep brought \$4 to \$5.25. These prices are 25c to 35c higher than they were a week ago.

Hogs: Although there was no change in the condition of the Toronto market for live hogs last week, yet a stronger feeling prevailed in the Montreal market on Monday and prices advanced 10c to 25c per cwt. Hogs off cars selling at \$9.75 to \$10. Butcher: Butcher ranged from 24c to 35c per lb on local farmers' markets through Ontario on Saturday last as follows: Berlin, 27c to 30c per lb; Brantford 28c to 30c; Kingston 32c to 35c and Stratford 28c to 30c.

Cheese: A firm feeling prevails in the market this week. Prices at local Cheese Boards ranging from 14 1/4c to 14 3/4c.

WARM PRAISE FOR ISLAND SOLDIER

Mrs. (Dr.) Conroy, city, Wednesday received a post card from her nephew, Mr. Fred Fraser, now a prisoner of war in Munster, Germany. He states that he is well and makes no complaint.

A letter written by the late Capt. McMeans of Winnipeg to his sister in that city refers to Mr. Fraser in these words: "Fred Fraser of the B. of M., about whom you enquire was perhaps the most reliable man I had. He was a Lance Corporal but would now be my company Quartermaster Sergeant if he was only here. Unfortunately he is missing and being the last one outside myself who left our trench when we were relieved I got him to help my servant who appeared to be dying from the effects of the previous day's gas. I had to go off to a flank to make some dispositions and never saw him again. The Germans that afternoon got all the country around where they were left and I hoped a gainst hope that they would not get my servant to whom I had lent a sword cane I had bought in Ypres and which might sign his death warrant if the Germans used it as an excuse for finishing him, though I did not expect he would live. Still from what I know of Fraser, though unwounded he would never have left my servant while he lived, and then again in my servant's pack was the helmet of a Prussian Guardsman I had told Lendrum I was sending home. I gave this to Fraser to carry. Really Lenore, dearest I cannot write about it further. The whole thing seems too awful to me as I see the picture of it all in front of me."

Capt. McMeans, the writer of the above splendid tribute to the young Island soldier was himself killed in action at Ypres ten days after writing the letter. The servant of Capt. McMeans referred to in the letter is also a prisoner along with Mr. Fraser and at last reports was quite recovered from the gas poisoning. The Ninth Battalion Winnipeg Rifles, to which Mr. Fraser belonged was entirely wiped out at the battle of Ypres when the Canadians were called upon to occupy the trenches vacated by the Algerians, all being either killed or taken prisoners.

BERLIN, via Sayville, September 27.—The German general staff was not surprised by the new Franco-British movement, says the Lokal Anzeiger, although on this occasion it was announced in advance. "The brave German troops withstood the onslaught," the newspaper continues, "and will hold out until the enemy has been driven back. The German iron wall is unshakable and insurmountable. "It is possible that the new movement was inspired more by political than by military reasons, in the desire to influence Balkan States, particularly Greece and Roumania, and to awe Bulgaria. Germany quietly awaits the issue."

In a review of the political and military situation the Vossische Zeitung says:—"All hopes and expectations of the Quadruple Entente have been wrecked everywhere—north, south, east and west. A year ago President Poincaré of France said that the French were marching upon Berlin. Grand Duke Nicholas of Russia was described as leading the Russian steam roller in the same direction. Lord Curzon expected to see Gurkhas at Potsdam. The British Admirals were to wipe the German fleet out of existence. "A glance at the war map is sufficient to show what really has been achieved."

of Canadian railway. He arrived in Winnipeg from The Pass yesterday, having attached his private car to a freight train.

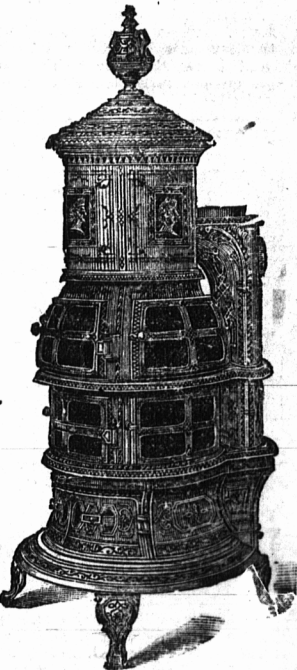
Mr. Cochrane has made a complete inspection trip of the new railways and terminals in Western Canada. He went to Mile 207 on the Hudson Bay Railway.
