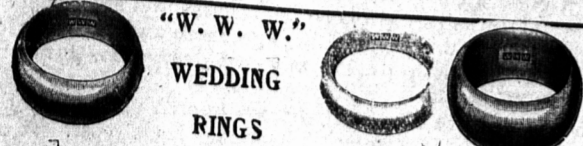

SOMETHING of a novelty in a pleasure boat here is being constructed by George Moore, the popular tonsepal artist. The yacht is 21 feet over all, will be flat bottomed with steel cartrig board and cabin, the roof of which can be extended, after the manner of a telescope for greater comfort when occupied for sleeping.
