BOSTON, Sept. 28.—Convinced that she has regained the form greater than during the previous year, Mr. Gallant reports. Between sixty and seventy per cent of the lobsters caught in the late season districts are being shipped alive to the American and Canadian markets. About twenty-five per cent of the early catch was shipped in the same way. This is a branch of the industry that is bound to develop, as better prices are obtained for live lobsters than in the can.

**Other Fisheries**  
The catch of mackerel, especially the fall season catch, will be much greater than during the previous year. The fishermen are getting plenty of employment and are receiving good wages. It is reported that one fisherman landed 5,000 mackerel in one week. The fish are of especially good quality and are selling at from fifteen to twenty cents each.

**Catch to Aug. 31st**  
The value of the total catch of fish in the Province this year up to and including August 31st was \$912,340. The following detailed statement is for the same period:  
Lobsters: catch, 59,632 cwt.; value \$78,714.  
Smelts: Catch, 5,724 cwt.; value \$39,629.

**FISHERIES REVIEWED**  
For the information of the visiting members of the British Empire Parliamentary Association the following facts with reference to last year's production are reprinted:  
The total value of production of the fisheries of Prince Edward Island for the year 1927 was \$1,367,807, compared with \$1,358,934 in 1926. These totals represent the value of the fish marketed, whether for consumption fresh or canned, 1,449, compared with 1,564 in 1926.

Oyster fishing is now in progress in East and West Rivers and tributaries, as well as in Vernon, Seal and Orwell rivers. The usual catch of between 4,000 and 5,000 barrels is anticipated. 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ROME, Sept. 28.—A despatch to Il Messaggero from Sorrento says that the civil marriage of Gene Tunney and Mary Josephine Lauder, of Greenwich, Conn., will take place in Sorrento, at the hotel "The House of Tasso," where the famous poet who wrote "Jerusalem" was born.

The correspondent pointed out that boxing had not been developed at the time of Tasso, but that the poet did chronicle some fights between Saracens and Christians and a duel between Argante and Tancredi, which was considered good enough as fighting.

The religious ceremony is likely to be held in the Sanctuary of the Chapel of Mary, Star of the Sea. This is situated within the walls of the Hotel Transitorio, a sanctuary often visited by the late Queen Margherita of Italy, and present Duchess of Aosta, and Ludwig, the mad king of Bavaria.

It is understood that the Podesta of Sorrento, Duke Giovanni Marosca Di Serracapriola Della Salanagh, has been approached to perform the civil ceremony.

The increase in value is accounted for by the higher prices obtained for some of the fish products in 1927, as the catches of all of the principal kinds of fish were smaller than in 1926. Lobstering is the most important branch of the fisheries industry of Prince Edward Island, its product in 1927 representing 63 per cent of the total value of production of the fisheries of the province. In 1927 the total catch of lobsters was 62,800 cwt., a decrease of 3,498 cwt. from the previous year, while the marketed value was \$855,917, a decrease of \$70,801.

The fish which contributed chiefly to the increase in total value of production was the smelt, which almost doubled its marketed value. Although the catch was less than in 1926, the catch of smelts in 1927 was 14,936 with a marketed value of \$179,232, compared with 15,390 cwt. and a marketed value of \$98,670 in 1926. Of the other principal kinds cod showed a decrease in catch and increase in marketed value, while herring and oysters showed decreases in catch and in marketed value.

**Capital, Equipment, Etc.**  
The amount of capital represented by the vessels, boats, traps, nets, piers and wharves, etc., used in catching and landing the fish was \$866,833, a decrease of \$38,212 from the preceding year.

The number of men engaged in these operations in 1927 was 2,675 compared with 2,916 in 1926. The total amount of capital invested in fish canning and curing establishments was \$250,640, compared with \$260,575 in 1926. These totals comprise the value of land, buildings and machinery, supplies on hand and cash and operating accounts. The number of establishments in operation in 1927 was 137, a decrease of 9 from the preceding year. The number of lobster canneries was 133, compared with 137 in 1926; the number of clam canneries 2, compared with 3; and the number of fish curing establishments compared with 6. One establishment classified as a miscellaneous fish cannery in 1927, was formerly operated as a clam cannery.

The number of persons employed in the establishments in 1927 was 1,449, compared with 1,564 in 1926.

MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—Elzear Rioux, French-Canadian heavy-weight, won a ten round decision over King Solomon, of Panama, at the Forum here tonight.

According to an announcement by the Boxing Commission Rioux was given the unanimous decision of judges and referee. He had led the fighting consistently from the second round to the end and frequently had his opponent hanging on. The weights were announced, Rioux 205 and Solomon 191.

In the first preliminary to the Rioux-Solomon fight George Siders punched his way to an eight round decision over Harry Smith. Siders weighed 142 1-2 and Smith 146. The men are Montrealers.

In the second preliminary Marty Gold, New York, and Harry England, fought eight rounds to a draw. The men are flyweights.

The decision was unpopular, many of the spectators believing Hill had the advantage.
