Writing to the Amherst News, D. W. Robb, President of the Robb Engineering Company, says the following respecting the pending reciprocity negotiations as affecting the Maritime Provinces: "I believe that Nova Scotia fishermen and farmers should be given the advantage of the wider market so that Canada will get the benefit of labor and the investment of allowing her boys to man the Gloucester fishing fleet and work in American factories as they are doing at present.

While it would undoubtedly be wise for our farmers to use their hay and oats, as far as possible in raising cattle and improving their farms, there is, frequently, as there was last year, a surplus of hay produced on the fertile marshes surrounding the Bay of Fundy. More could be produced by improving unproductive tracts of marsh land if there was a larger market available and this surplus hay could be exported without depleting the soil which is kept up by tidal deposits.

In the same way the thrifty farmers of Prince Edward Island are able to keep up their farms and export a surplus of potatoes, oats, etc., on account of the abundant seaweed and other natural fertilizers that they have at hand, so that the increased market would benefit them greatly."

Rev. A. Graham-Barton, a clergyman well known in this city and who visited here for a short time last summer, has a letter in the Halifax Chronicle on Parliament and Prohibition which is of much interest. He is a native of England and is a Past Grand Chaplain of the English Good Templars. He but recently came over to locate in Canada.

The explanation of the Prussian franchise policy which was recently given by the German chancellor during a debate on the Reichstag was the frankest determination which we remember to have heard of the determination of Prussia to retain and to exercise the hegemony of the empire.

The newly granted franchise of Alsace-Lorraine was under consideration and attention was called to the fact that it was much more liberal than that of Prussia. This the chancellor admitted, saying that Prussia was quite "willing to grant to the Reichland a far more liberal franchise than she would permit her own subjects to enjoy. He added a strong suggestion that there was no room for expecting Prussia, ever, or at any rate in the measurable future, to grant any material changes in the franchise.

The reason for this attitude of resolute conservatism was plainly given. Prussia has the leadership in imperial policy. Her prime minister is always chancellor of the empire, and thus the composition of the imperial ministry depends directly upon that of the Prussian ministry. If the Prussian franchise were liberalized the imperial ministry would be dependent upon changing popular whims and fancies and would consequently lack stability, and in turn the imperial ministry, and thus the whole policy of the empire would be subject to similar changes. It is in order to guard against that—which would be regarded as a catastrophe—that Prussia is resolved to maintain her present antiquated and narrow system of class voting, under which political control is exercised by a small minority of the population and by a minority whose political complexion is unchangeable.

It is not unnatural that Prussia should thus hold the headship of the empire, partly because her king is always emperor and partly because she contains nearly two-thirds of the population of the empire and a corresponding proportion of its wealth. It will be part of the prudence, however, for that fact to be held in abeyance, or at any rate not to be too obtrusively exploited, for some other states are intensely proud and jealous. There was never a more loyal Prussian than Bismarck, and yet there was never a man who had more scrupulous regard for particularism and for the susceptibilities of the other states of the empire, and it is largely a Prussian empire, and it will probably grow more so, but for its own good it must be so in fact rather than in name.—New York Tribune.

There are many horses of all ages that are not thriving well, although consuming a reasonable amount of food, and their owners are at a loss to account for it, and often spend money in vain for powders, stock foods, etc., without result. The animals do not show symptoms of illness, but simply do not thrive, and have not the spirit or energy they should have. The cause in the majority of cases, will be found in the mouth, either in the form of dental decay or irregularities of the teeth. The subjects do not require medical treatment all that is needed is intelligent attention to the teeth. We say "intelligent attention" as in many cases unskilled or ignorant interference does much more harm than good. It requires a man who thoroughly understands the anatomy of the mouth, and has the necessary instruments and skill to correct whatever is wrong.
