## Schumacher Sparks Giants To 3-1 Victory Over Cards; Cubs Trounce Dodgers 7-2

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 25—Hal Schumacher was back in form today for the first time in a month and his pitching arm and power hitting bat, sparked the Giants to a 3-1 victory over St. Louis Cardinals in a National League ball game.

The ball game. Bill Terry's error win enabled Bill Terry's error to hold their 2-1 game margin in first place in the league, and marked the first time in two weeks they had put two consecutive wins together.

Schumacher, in his first full-time job since he was whipped by Bobo Newsom, pitched six innings against the gas house team.

Schumacher put the game on its feet in the fifth by striking a long ball into the upper left field stands.

In Brooklyn, Larry French, Chicago Cubs' southpaw ace, pitched a three-hitter to trounce the Dodgers 7-2.

In addition to his flinging, French struck the most damaging blow in the 10th by striking a long ball at Ted Pressnell by doubling the bases loaded in the eighth inning to send the final three home.

The Phillies won their third straight game by a one-game margin, beating Pittsburgh 2-1 as Jack Walters bested Jim Tobin in pitcher's battle.

Home runs by little Emmett Miller, Phil's second sacker, in the second inning, provided the scoring run.

Second Deacon Danny MacFay's seven-hit pitching, Boston's gained their fourth overtime victory over the current champion Red Sox by defeating Cincinnati Reds 2-1 in 11 innings.

MacFay's fourth win of the season and he did not issue a walk or error out a single Red.

## Yankee Star Nears End Of Playing Career

NEW YORK, May 25—(CP)—The goddess of fortune frowns on her one-time favorite, George (Twink) Selkirk, the outfield star of the New York Yankees, and baseball fandom wondered today if the big slugger from Huntsville, Ont., was nearing his final inning in the major leagues.

To Selkirk fell the job of filling Babe Ruth's shoes and until he wrenched a shoulder a year ago, homers scored off his mighty bat in a way that reminded of the Bambino's hey-day.

Selkirk was the laughing boy of the Yankees then but today it's a different story. One injury after another has plagued him and George—no longer a youngster—sees Tommy Henrich and Joe DiMaggio sweeping up while Selkirk's big league career seems to slip away as he waits for an injured wrist to mend.

During the 1937 training season Selkirk was "hot". Homers cracked off his bat from the opening day and by the end of June his 17 homers led the American League.

His batting average was .348. But on June 29 Twink dived for a fly ball, ripped a shoulder muscle and the goddess of baseball fortune virtually waved good bye. He was chipped a bone in his elbow, was out for the rest of the season and disappeared in the world series.

Since that year he has been comeback year. But in Philadelphia he is injured a wrist nerve. Now Selkirk is on the Yankee bench, vainly trying to catch fortune's smile once more.

## Barney Ross & Armstrong Clash Tonight

(By Alan Goul, Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, May 25—Two of the greatest fighting men, pound for pound, that the ring has produced in at least a decade are primed to settle the first major argument of the 1938 outdoor season.

Unless bad weather beats them to the punch, Barney Ross and Henry Armstrong will give fandom a much-awaited thrill over the 15-round title distance in Madison Square Garden bowl tomorrow night. If it rains the show will go on Friday night.

It's theoretically an unprecedented "handicap match," with Ross defending the 147-pound or world weight championship against the dusky young whirlwind who holds the featherweight title, at 126 pounds, but actually the bout is a "natural" in which the disparity in weight has been thoroughly minimized.

The agreement between the principals calls for Ross to make 142 pounds and Armstrong to make 136 on the official scales tomorrow noon. When the pair finished light training today, Ross was a midtown gym and Armstrong at his Pompton Lakes, N. J., camp, there was no indication either would have difficulty tipping the beam inside the prescribed limitations.

The fight figures to draw 25,000 cash customers and gross gate receipts of \$150,000.

Ross, confident, crafty and apparently in first-class condition, routes the 7 to 5 choice to stop the winning streak of the negro who has been blasting his way through the little fellows for nearly two years.

Armstrong however figures to throw three or four punches to every one his opponent tries. The negro's string of 37 consecutive victories, 35 of them by K. O., sounds more impressive than it actually is. But it emphasizes Armstrong's finishing ability and can't be entirely discounted.

## Sandy Somerville Among 32 Select Survivors For British Amateur Crown

(TROON, Scotland, May 25—(CP)—A select 32 containing such magnificent golfing names as Tolley, Torrance, Goodman, Kocsis and Haas remained tonight of the more than 200 who started Monday in pursuit of the British amateur crown—and Canada's Sandy Somerville was among them.

In a long day of double firing that cleaned up the second round and accounted for the third; that saw defending champion Robert Sweeney swept into the yawning bunkers and such stars as old Frances Quimet of Boston, English champion Frank Pennick and Scotland's own Gordon Peters fall by the wayside, silent Sandy came marching home with victory after giving Canadian hopes a jolt with a wobbly start.

Bob Rutherford of England took advantage of Sandy's errors and had the London, Ont. veteran one down and the turn. But like the tournament war horse that he is, Somerville rallied on the home stretch, shot seven holes in one under fours and wound up with a three and two victory.

In the fourth round tomorrow Walter S. McLeod of Ranfurly, England, will try to snuff out Somerville's attempt to evade him, either major amateur title to evade him. Many times the champion of his native Dominion, he is the only Canadian ever to win the United States crown.

The man he beat for the latter bauble in 1932—Johnny Goodman who, incidentally, now holds it—retained his fine form today and advanced with a big six and five win over Albert Briscoe of Ireland.

In addition to Quimet, the Walker Cup team captain, who was beaten, one up, by burly Cecil Ewing of Ireland, Reynold Smith of the United States forges on. Jocelyn Walker, former Cambridge captain, eliminated young Smith by a margin of two up.

The most brilliant spot of golf during the day was shot by E. W. Hattersley, who was Australian champion in 1930. It was fired at Gordon Peters, the brow sweater carrying many Scottish hopes, but it was so scintillating even the dour Scotsman in the gallery had to gasp in admiration.

The Australian was even with par 36 going out and only managed to hold Peters even. But he bridled four on the back nine to win four and two. In doing it he holed a 60-yard chip on the green and holed a putt of the same length at the 14th. Against that, there wasn't anything Peters could do but join in the admiration.
