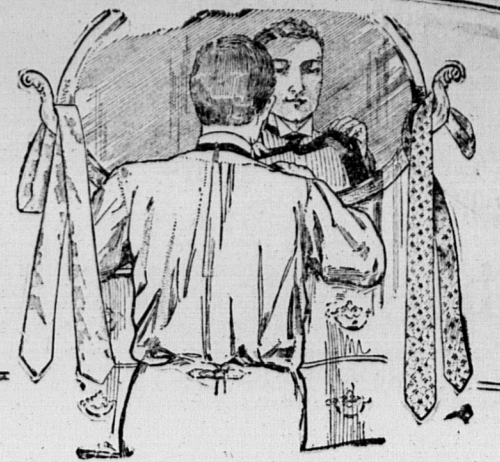

LAYMEN'S MISSIONARY MEETING AT BROOKFIELD

BROOKFIELD, March 13. — From signs already manifested there can be no doubt that the men of our churches in Prince Edward Island are ready to swing into the current of the Laymen's movement. The spirit is there and our people need only be approached with the common-sense, and businesslike methods of the movement, and they will respond. The time is opportune, all that is needed is an organization that will reach each congregation. A meeting under the auspices of The Laymen's Movement was held in Brookfield March 10th at 2 p. m., to which a good representation gathered from all parts of the congregation. T. C. James, Secretary for the Laymen's Movement for Charlottetown, gave the address. "The Christian people of P. E. I.," he said, "have always been to the front in the cause of missions. The Presbytery of P. E. I. was chiefly instrumental in sending out the first missionary ever sent from the British Colonies, and last year undertook to support a missionary of its own over and above its regular contributions, and with very gratifying results. These movements are adding chapters to the unfinished 'Book of Acts.' This Laymen's Movement," he said, "is carrying us back to Apostolic usages, when every man in his own way preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Every person, who received the Gospel, felt that in some way he must impart the blessing to others. It is reasonable. The man with the gift of song, or a talent for business has as much a place in the Kingdom of God as the preacher of the Gospel."

After briefly reviewing the Movement from its inception, the speaker said, "To accomplish the task of Evangelization, it now remains to entrust the general support of the Laymen. Hitherto this work was left to the women, and the ministers. The Laymen as a body had little interest and did nothing, now the men of the church especially the business men are moving into line. The entire Foreign Field is divided among the Christian Nations, Canada, while fully recognizing her own missionary problem is certainly undertaking her share in the evangelization of the world. The proposition requires that every congregation in Canada shall definitely assume its responsibility in this great task."

The practical question then left for the meeting to decide was this. Shall we as a congregation stand by Canada in her undertaking? In solving the financial side of the question can we promise for the congregation an average of 10 cents a week per communicant? The necessity of regular, and systematic giving was emphasized. "The weekly system, Mr. James stated," is found to be the most satisfactory. It is scriptural. It is a weekly sermon, reminding of God's goodness, giving a ready outlet for gratitude, and a very real manifestation of interest in the Lord's cause."

The whole scheme of the movement laid before the meeting had their hearty support. Before separating it was decided that during the coming year the congregation endeavor to raise for Home and Foreign Missions an average of 5 cents a week per member, and adherent which amounts at least to 10 cents per member. After thanking Mr. James for his excellent address and helpful advice the meeting closed with prayer.

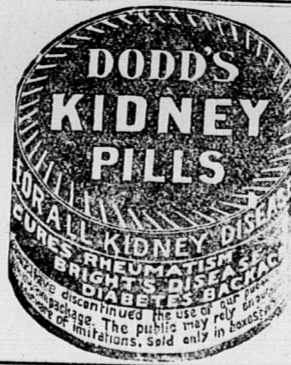

CLOSE SEASON FOR LOBSTERS.

OTTAWA, March 13. — At the meeting of the Fisheries Committee, Prof. Prince urged closed season for lobsters along the coast of the Maritime Provinces be made July 1st, to Jan. 1st, or that the closed season as specified be applied to the coast west and south of Cape Canso; for the remainder of the coast north of Cape Canso, the closed season be from July 15th to Jan. 1st. A closed season is needed for the spawning months. Kyte urged that the licenses of the offending packers be instantly cancelled. Prince thought Canadian canners should have prior consideration to licenses, that licenses should not be granted to American canners. This was endorsed by the Committee. Hon. Mr. Brodeur stated that additional hatcheries would be established.

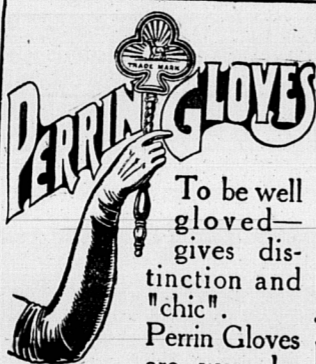

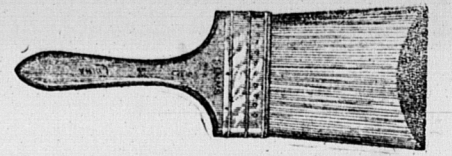
