WOLVERINES' EVEN SERIES WITH ROYALS

Take Early Lead To Whip Royals In Third Game 4-2

Lawlor Hero Of Tilt. Final Game Series To Be Played Friday Night.

HALIFAX, April 10—Halifax Wolverines sank their fans deep into Montreal Royals tonight for a 4-2 triumph that avenged their 4-3 wound of Monday and put them back on an even footing with their rivals in the Eastern Canadian amateur hockey championship battle.

Manager Jack Conn went into the box beside Coach "Red" Stuart with the remark "two heads are better than one," and helped to pilot his Wolverines to the victory that pushed the Allan Cup finals further into next week.

Next Game Friday

The Quebec-Ontario champions and the rejuvenated Maritimers clash again Friday night, the winners crossing sticks Monday with Port Arthur Bearcats, Western champions, in the first game of the Canadian title series for the trophy Moncton Hawks brought to the seaside provinces for the first time in 1933.

Snapping around the Royal fortress from the opening whistle, Wolverines had the invaders on the run for the first two periods and then held them off during a bone-crushing final period when the Montrealers bore in with a vicious attack.

Starting the second period one man short, Wolverines became cautious. Royals sprang forward with great confidence but Lawlor trapped them. Grabbing the puck just inside his own bluelines, Lawlor defended well.

Both teams were at full strength when Lawlor Owen Lennon split the Royal defence, drew Seguin out and shoved the rubber in for the third goal.

Hughie Farquharson gave Royals hope when he flipped in the rebound from Dave Neville's backhand shot, but that was offset a minute later by Ron Hudson's score from a mixup in front of the Montreal goal.

The heavy bumping was done in the third period as Royals drove the Wolves hard. Neville snapped in Montreal's second counter after a minute of rough play when Hudson gave him the rubber on a careless clearance.

Conn's starting line—McClashen, Hudson and Lennon—carried the battle into Royal territory from the opening whistle but the Montrealers played a great defensive game.

Lawlor wiggled through shortly after the six minute mark, drew Seguin out and passed to Moeher, who snapped the marker home for the first goal of the game.

The Wolves were fresh and far better organized than in the earlier matches, and Royals were forced to bat the puck up the ice for relief time and again.

McClashen stickhandled the length of the ice only to be tripped by Munday, who drew a penalty. Stuart put on four forwards, who bored in on Seguin relentlessly but found the 20-year-old Montreal net minder too smart for them.

Frankie Graham, 150 pound Halifax defenceman who plays opposite Frankie Lavigne, five pounds lighter, made a beautiful rush and split the Royal defence, but Seguin was there and what looked like a sure goal was saved.

Royals bucked-up then and ganged around "Daddy" Bubar for the last minute of the period. MacQuisten lifted the rubber high over an open net. Frankie Lavigne was waved off for tripping just before the bell.

You will note by the Secretary-Treasurer's report that, the library is on the wrong side of the ledger. This is due to the fact that expenditures for the up-keep of the grounds were extra heavy the past season, together with the falling off in membership dues. Did you ever stop to think? It is done! It is done by very few energetic, and enthusiastic members, and as you all know our faithful supporters Mac MacKinnon and Gus Bentley are outstanding. I feel, ladies and gentlemen, that we should show our appreciation by at least paying our dues early, thereby saving the secretary time and worry.

I might say here that I have heard from good authority that, it is quite possible the Dominion Championship will be held in the Maritimes in 1937—and that Charlottown would be considered — this of course means, that we should not neglect the erection of a new club house.

Mr. Harry Richardson was unanimously endorsed as chairman of a building fund committee to work out ways and means of providing for the establishment of a club house that will be adequate to the requirements of members, providing greater facilities for entertainment and other social activities. The construction of the proposed building will not be undertaken until the necessary funds have been procured.
