A TELEGRAM received last night stated that the Princess would not leave Point du Chene until nine o'clock and no guarantee was given that the steamer would sail at that hour owing to the storm. In consequence the express pulled out of Summerside at 9.20 and arrived in the city at 11.30. If the Princess effects a crossing during the night her passengers and mails will be brought to the city this morning by the regular train.

The St John Globe devotes a leading article to the situation in West Queens in the course of which it says:

"Whoever is responsible for the public meetings at which their respective claims are discussed is not showing very great discretion, for at those meetings things are said which must be comforting to the Opposition, while they must leave unpleasant memories to both gentlemen. At this distance it would seem to be far better and wiser for the party itself by a convention or a committee or in some like way to put its candidate in the field. Now, matters appear to be so fixed that nothing can be done until the political bones of one of the contestants are left upon the field, while the other will be so weakened that the enemy may easily slay him. The Patriot, the Liberal paper, represents Mr. Hazzard as saying that after the bitter attacks made upon him by the Premier at the meeting at which both of them were 'it seems hopeless to expect a settlement of this unfortunate state of affairs in any other way than the usual way, and that was by a properly conducted convention which he was prepared to stand by if Mr. Farquharson will do the same,' and he declared that he was prepared 'to sign an agreement with Mr. Farquharson to that effect.' This is undoubtedly the reasonable course, and it must come to this in the end. Mr Farquharson does not seem to object to a convention and appears to have expressed a willingness to enter one, provided that it will nominate the only person who, in his judgement and under all the circumstances, is best entitled to the nomination—himself."
