Recommendations Made By Farmers Of Maritimes

MONCTON, N.B., Jan. 20 (CP) - The annual meeting of the Maritime Agriculture Federation here today urged Maritime potato producers to plan establishment of seed potato marketing boards in the Maritimes in time for next year's crop.

Some 20 to 25 delegates representing Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island passed 12 resolutions covering a wide range of Maritime farmers' problems. Suggestions were made to meet the questions which face them because of reduced markets following devaluation of the British pound and reduced prices without a corresponding drop in feed and equipment prices.

The resolutions urged: 1. Establishment of floor prices at levels equal to those maintained under the expiring British contracts for bacon, eggs and cheese. The government was asked to work immediately toward trade arrangements to permit easier flow of goods between nations, particularly the United Kingdom. Canada must export large volumes of agricultural products if she was to pay for needed imports and this was one way of doing it.

2. Censure of breaches of the fertilizer analysis and sales agreement. Some fertilizer companies were mixing and selling low analysis mixtures contrary to the agreement of the Maritime Fertilizer Council. All farmer organizations should do everything possible to see that farmers buy only the approved formula.

3. Immediate establishment of co-ordinated egg marketing boards in every province. A farmers' vote would be taken in the Maritimes for support of such a plan and if endorsed by a 60 per cent vote that similar votes be taken in other provinces to put a Canadian egg marketing scheme into effect.

4. Establishment of a price support policy by the Dominion government for the next five months until marketing boards are set up. Poultry producers were meeting with definite losses in egg production and there appeared to be no such plan in the offing.

5. Support of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture in its continued efforts to have speculative trading in grains in Canada eliminated and have a marketing channel which would give more stabilization to the cost of feed grains to Eastern Canadian farmers.

6. Reaffirmation of the Federation's support for freight assistance in feed grain coming from Western Canada which it was hoped would be continued and adopted as a permanent policy.

7. Unqualified support for the Chignecto Canal, endorsement of the present system of radio control in Canada and approval of the action of the Maritime and Canadian Federations in the submission of recent briefs on radio control to the Massey Commission.

8. Support and continuance of the Federal hog bonus policy of \$2 on grade A and \$1 on grade B.

9. Adoption of compulsory grading of meat butter in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland immediately. This resolution, submitted by Prince Edward Island, said P. E. I. had definite plans to adopt buter print grading this year.

10. Investigation by the Dominion Government through the Combines Investigation Act of inventions that have been bought by competitive industry and kept from the public to make them available to everybody.

11. Establishment of a general educational program on soil conservation through the co-operation of the Dominion and Provincial governments. This campaign would be backed by a publicity campaign to arouse public attention to the need for such a program.

12. Discussion of a policy for control of Bangs disease in cattle at the annual meeting of the Canadian Agriculture Federation at Niagara Falls, Ont. Pressure should be brought upon the Federal Agriculture Department for compulsory tests for cattle entering a Province and public auction and vaccination of all calves.
