McDonald who has just recently returned from the front, where he was severely wounded several months ago. Chas. E. McDuff occupied the chair and gave the opening address. On the platform with Mr. McDuff was the pastor Rev. R. H. Stavert, and also the near relatives of the different soldier lads who had gone out from the station. Mr. McDuff in his address spoke of what a large number of young men had gone out from this part of P. E. Island to fight for the cause of right and of what great reason the people had to be proud of them. He told of how two of the young Canadians, who had saved the day at the second battle of Ypres had been brought up within a stone's throw of the hall in which they were holding their meeting. The two young men referred to were the two sons of Mrs. Alex. Boston. The Chairman wished Mr. McDonald to know how well all appreciated what he had done for them and to realize that the welcome they now extended to him was indeed a whole hearted one. The following programme was then carried out: Song—"The Boys Come Home." Selection on the Gramophone.—Evellette Johnson; Reading—"The Courting of Phillomena."—Miss Florrie McLean; Encore. Molly; Address Rev. R. H. Stavert. Song "It's a Long Way to Tipperary"; Encore "Just Before the Battle"; Selection on the Gramophone Private McDonald was then presented with an address and a signet ring. The address was read by Rev. R. H. Stavert and the ring was presented by Mrs. A. D. McPherson. Just after the presentation was made the boys sang "He's a Jolly Good fellow" and gave three cheers for their soldier hero. In a few words Mr. McDonald told his friends what a surprise they had given him and how much he appreciated their kindness in giving him such a splendid remembrance on his home coming. A dainty lunch was then served. The rest of the evening was spent in playing games and the happy gathering was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
