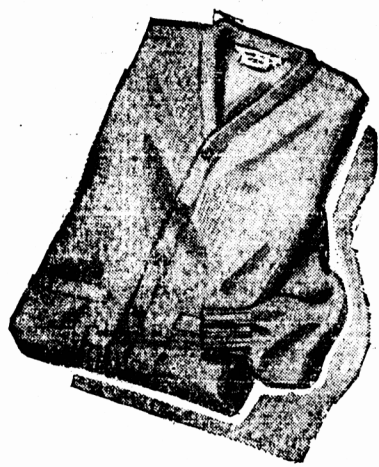

**International Nickel Earned \$1.32 a Share On Common**

The report of The International Nickel Company of Canada, Limited, and subsidiaries for the six months ended June 30, 1948, issued by Robert C. Stanley, Chairman and President, shows net profit in terms of U. S. currency of \$20,235,006 after all charges, equivalent, after preferred dividend requirements, to \$1.32 a share on the common stock. This compares with net profit of \$16,460,339, or \$1.06 a common share, in the corresponding period a year ago. In the quarter ended June 30, 1948, net profit was \$6,812,201, equal to 64¢ a share on common, comparable with \$1.0415,706, or 88¢ a common share, in the preceding quarter.
