THE CONTEST IN NORTH YORK.

Evidently the election in North York where Hon. A. B. Aylesworth is seeking to qualify as Postmaster General is to be a spirited and interesting contest. Mr. Aylesworth has his prestige as an eminent lawyer, the facts that the country is prosperous, the treasury overflowing and the Government's big majority in the country, all in his favor. These are factors always favorable to a ministerial candidate. Then there is the fact that North York had long returned Sir William Mulock by increasing majorities which at the last election ran up to almost 1000 votes. To offset this the Opposition claim that Mr. Aylesworth is not a popular politician; that he is almost new to political life having only once been a candidate and was then defeated in the old Liberal riding of Durham; that he is a non-resident of North York, whereas Mr. Mulock had a summer home in that riding.

Moreover Mr. Aylesworth has been a great corporation lawyer, which calling is not usually a popular one among farmers who make up the bulk of the constituency, and is opposed to public ownership which Sir William favored, and which is said to be growing in popular regard. And some things have changed since Sir William's latest triumph in North York. The Ross Government has been overturned in Ontario, and the autonomy bills and the salary graft bill have been enacted, neither of which are quite to the liking of the sturdy farmers of North York. And the riding has not always been a Liberal one. In 1872 it returned an Independent and in 1878 a Conservative. Mr. Mulock's majority in 1882 was but 100 and in 1900 but 207. There remains to be stated the fact that The Globe, which circulates largely in York as the chief organ of Liberalism, at first strongly opposed both the autonomy bills and the salary-pension grab. On these grounds the Opposition will perhaps be able to sustain their hopes, at least until election day.

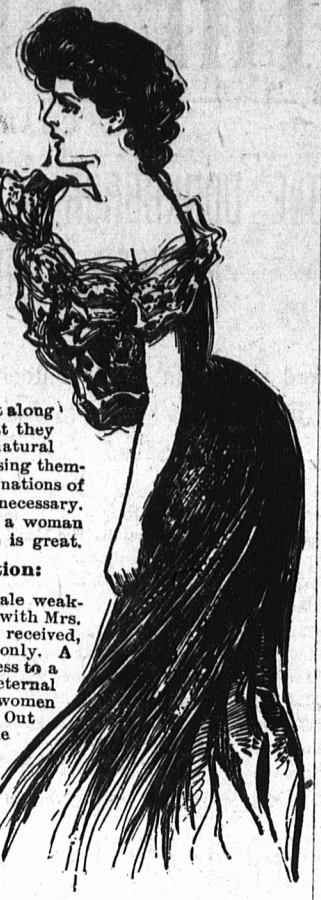
