—FARMERS' MEETING.—The Egmont Bay Farmers' Institute held an important meeting in the Egmont Bay Hall on March 20th. In the absence of the president Mr. Ed. Hilbert Polier, Mr. John F. Arsenault, Vice President, occupied the chair. The attendance was fairly large, and the audience were treated to a good opening speech by Mr. Arsenault. The speaker greatly impressed them on the advantages, and the important benefits derived therefrom. He insisted on the noble profession of Agriculture, and explicitly showed how its importance was realized at this critical period. Canada which is essentially a farming country had risen up in the eyes of the world by its valuable exports of farm products and also by its rally to the Empire in supplying men and money. The minutes of the last meeting were then read and adopted. The first speaker on the programme was Mr. X. O. Gallant of St. Chrysostome who gave an interesting sketch of the dairy conference held at Charlottetown some weeks ago. Mr. Gallant had collected various statistics and was able to impart valuable information to his hearers. The conference had explained to them how the Island dairy products compared with those of other provinces. The essential qualities of cheese were touched on, and as was stated, the quality of cheese depended on the quality of milk. Suggestions were given whereby the patrons could be impressed with the importance of caring for the milk to be sent to the factory. A very interesting discussion had taken place, and it was found out that such meetings of delegates,

cheese-makers, and other dairymen, must result beneficially to the dairy business. Mr. Joseph H. Arsenault was the next speaker. Mr. Arsenault had attended the Central Farmers' Institute Meeting at Charlottetown and gave a brief report of what had been done there. He then touched on Rotation of Crops and explained that the nature of the soil was the chief deciding factor in choosing a rotation. Weeds had also to be taken into consideration as well as the live stock a farmer kept. Mr. Joseph G. Arsenault, cheese-maker was next called on to speak. Mr. Arsenault had also attended the dairy conference and said that from the tone of the meeting he inferred that the cheese industry was being given the preference to the butter industry. He quoted figures showing that value of cheese exported was increasing and this was hopeful for the cheese patrons. Mr. Arsenault then went on to explain the proper method of handling milk. There were several good ways he said but there was one way he recommended and proved its superiority by actual results. Mr. Peter S. Galant spoke on the method of applying live stock manure on the farm. Mr. Gallant showed a masterly knowledge of this subject, yet his suggestions gave rise to an interesting discussion. The growing of clover, the amount sowed per acre, the method of preparing it for housing, all these things were ably dealt with. Other speakers were Mr. Stanislaus Gallant, Eli E. Arsenault, Joseph Arsenault, Almi D. Arsenault. This meeting was perhaps one of the most interesting and instructive, held in any agricultural community and no doubt noticeable results would follow the adoption of many suggestions given there that evening.—M.

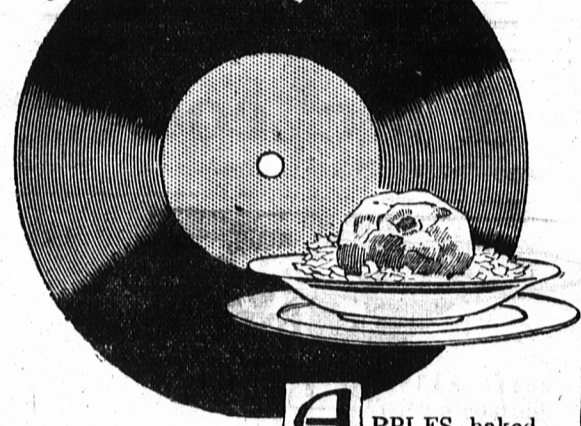
