The sale of the Desbrisay property on the corner of Pownal and Grafton Streets, City, was conducted yesterday by Robert Bearsto. The purchaser of the dwelling on the corner was William Hennessey and the price paid was \$2,000. The warehouse adjoining was sold by private sale to Dr. S. R. Jenkins.

Several questions have been asked the last few days as to flying flags at half-mast, and for general information it may be stated that the flag should first be hoisted to the mast-head, and then lowered to half-mast, but not more than the width of the flag from the top of the pole, otherwise it looks unsightly if very low. Halfyards should be gathered in tightly. All flags are lowered at sunset whether from half-mast or not.

The funeral took place from her daughters, Mrs Lowther's home on Friday, May 6th, to the Clyde River Cemetery. The services at the house were conducted by Rev Wm. Field, and Rev Wm Thomson, and at the grave by Rev Mr Field, Rev Mr Green and Rev Mr Calder. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved relatives.
