—MONTGOMERY Able To Cope With Rommel—

As Britain's third all-out offensive gathers momentum for the known to the sandy Egyptian grave yard of its many military reputations, it seems apparent that the army of the Nile has at last found a leader in the person of the rough-and-tumble field Marshal Erwin Rommel, ex-storm trooper and former extra-ordinary. Allied thrusts have been blunted. He is Lt. Gen. Bernard Law Montgomery, a former tank commander in the Middle East last August, gained fame when he stopped Rommel's drive on Alexandria two months ago after the Germans and Italians rolled the British troops in to Egypt and threatened to drive to Suez.

As these forces swung into action bombers and fighters made unremitting assaults against Axis positions day and night. One by one Italian-German strong points were overcome, and eventually Rommel's whole army was in retreat. When Montgomery was appointed General Officer Commanding, British home guards in 1941, he ordered a quarter-hour's physical training at 7 a.m. for all headquarters officers and clerks under 40. All ranks up to Brigadier had to run a six-mile course once a week.

### Highlights Of New Drive In Desert War

Highlights of the British 8th Army's offensive in the Egyptian Desert follow: Oct. 21—Offensive opens at 9.40 P.M. with thunderous artillery barrage. Lt. Gen. Montgomery says objective is "to destroy Rommel and his army." Four-day aerial onslaught by R.A.F. and Allied bombers paves way for ground attack. Naval forces attack Axis coastal positions near Matruh. Oct. 24—Main Axis positions are penetrated at some points during darkness; gains are held by light in face of enemy counter-attacks. Oct. 25—British forces bag 1,450 German and Italian prisoners by 6 P.M.; push further into Axis defences by night. Oct. 26—Allies maintain initiative but both sides withhold major tank forces. Oct. 27—First large-scale armored clash develops; Axis forces suffer considerable loss and are driven off. Oct. 28—Axis confined to minor tank engagements on ground; Allied armor pound enemy lands, ground and forward positions. Oct. 29—Enemy tanks sunk by torpedo planes. Oct. 30—British infantry extends gains in overnight fighting, capturing number of German prisoners. Ongoing armored forces engaged in minor clashes. Oct. 31—Axis forces suffer sharp losses in futile attempts to regain lost ground by counter-attacks. Oct. 31—British forces beat off further counter-attacks after advancing again during night and capturing additional enemy prisoners. Allied armor continue to pound Axis lines and supply bases. Nov. 1—Allied break-through pockets Axis infantry and tanks in narrow sector near coast; enemy attempts to cut way out fail. Two Axis supply ships sunk by bombs Nov. 2—Important advance on southern flank made by British infantry; more enemy prisoners are taken. Armored breakthroughs on considerable scale for first time, but Rommel withdraws his tanks after six-hour fight. Allied offensive reaches its peak. Nov. 3—Axis Northern flank driven back beyond Sid El Rahmani, 15 miles west of El Alamein; southern flank of enemy line also pushed back again. Nov. 4—Axis forces crack under wedgehammer blows, retreat in disorder hotly pursued by 8th Army and pounded by Allied air forces. R.C.A.F. discloses Canadian forces are playing a full part in the operation.

### Premier Godbout Reshuffles His Quebec Cabinet

QUEBEC, Nov. 5.—(CP)—Premier Godbout reshuffled his Quebec Cabinet today, giving portfolios to three Ministers previously without portfolios and bringing in three Legislature Members to restore the Cabinet to full strength of 15 men.

The six appointments, long anticipated in Quebec political circles, were announced by Premier Godbout following a lengthy session of the Cabinet. The announcement gave no explanation for the shifting of the portfolios from the Premier's shuffling of his cabinet, stressed in public addresses the importance of colonization in post-war rehabilitation. Nor was any reason given for the transfer of the Public Works portfolio from Roads Minister Bouchard to Mr. Danneberg. Hon. Leon Casgrain, who recently was appointed as Attorney-General, has been handling the portfolios of Colonization, Fisheries and Game since Mr. Cole was appointed to the Quebec Superior Court about a month ago.

### Heavy Traffic

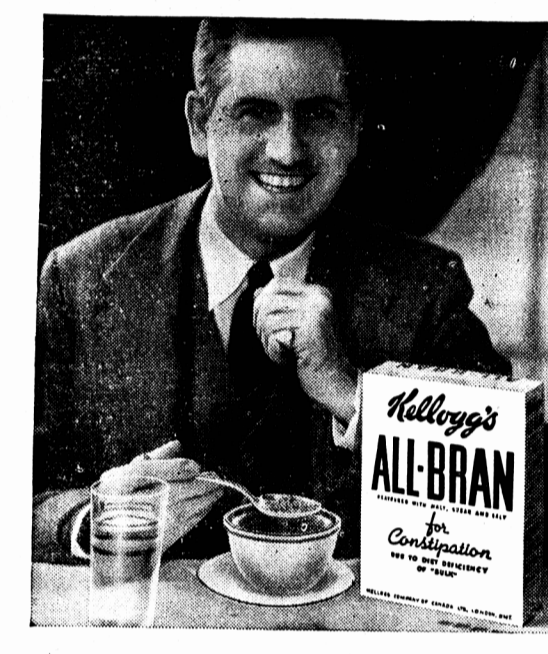

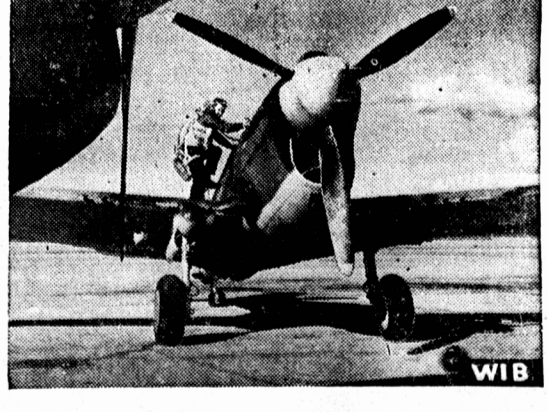
### To Probe Death Of N. B. Coyle

STEPHEN, N.B., Nov. 5.—(CP)—An inquiry will be held here tomorrow afternoon into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ingersoll, who were killed instantly today when an automobile in which they were driving was in collision with a C.P.R. passenger train running between Macadam and St. Stephen. The accident occurred at the public crossing near the outskirts of this town, commonly known as the Valley Crossing. Almon McIntyre was engineer of the train, Donald Gray, fireman and B.A. Craig, conductor.

One cup shortening, 1-2 cups dark corn syrup, 1-2 cup honey, 2 eggs, 3 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-2 cups seedless raisins. Melt the shortening, mix thoroughly with corn syrup and honey. Add eggs, beaten, and mix again. Stir in baking powder, salt cinnamon and nutmeg and add gradually. Finally drop into greased muffin tins and bake at 400 degrees F. for nearly 10 minutes, watching closely.

### FRUIT DROPS

Four tablespoons butter or good shortening, 2-3 cup maple syrup, 1 cup flour, 1-2 teaspoon baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 3 cups melted chocolate, 1 cup chopped nuts, (walnuts, pecans or cashews are preferable but peanuts are very good.) Melt the shortening, add the maple syrup and sugar which are well beaten, and egg which are well beaten, and flour, baking powder and salt and add, a little of them at a time, to the melted chocolate and mix thoroughly. Drop from a small spoon onto buttered baking sheet and bake at 450 degrees F. for about 10 minutes, watching them closely to prevent burning.

### Describe Break-Through

The unbearable punishment of British gunfire and aerial bombardment which finally—after 11 nights of incessant ordeal—rolled back Rommel's first-line infantry was related by Frank L. Martin, Associated Press battle correspondent, in a dispatch written Tuesday night.

The withdrawal started in the northern sector, which had been under constant barrage for a week, and the bombardment had reached such a pitch of violence that the Germans, injured to artillery terror in Russia, fell shell-shocked into British captivity. "The enemy was up against an ominous, ever-expanding bulge carved by British infantry into the fortifications west of the gap in the Alamein line, and bristling with tanks and other armored machines."
