The latest news, first of all.

The preliminary hearing in the case against Leo McIntyre and Irving Lewis, charged with breaking into the Alberton station in June last, was heard before St. J. J. The following clipped from the "Island Farmer," Summerside, shows that the Union Commercial College is getting excellent results in the Summerside, as well as in the Charlottetown school. U. C. C. graduates are noted for their good penmanship. "We had the pleasure yesterday of examining some specimens of penmanship by students of the Union Commercial College Summerside. The work done by the student from entrance to graduation is kept on file, thus showing the progress made from day to day and the result is really marvellous. The evolution from the cramped, stiff, irregular hand of the beginner to the smooth, regular, business hand of the trained student is a revelation to those who believe that the penman, like the poet, is born, not made. The work done in the U. C. C. shows conclusively that good penmanship can be acquired by special training and that the stiffest and most awkward hand can be developed into that of an artist. Miss McGreggor, who is in charge of this department certainly possesses the art of teaching and has good cause to be proud of her work. There is a large number of students in attendance and they are a happy family. Evening classes in penmanship at the U. C. C. place this art within reach of all at a moderate cost."—Island Farmer.

The farmers and traders should pull together and strive to hold the local provincial trade. It would be a mistake to hold the oats back for higher prices and allow the western grain to fill the already weakening Provincial market.

Lefurgey, a prominent real estate operator of this city, was knocked down by an automobile at the corner of Granville and Georgia Streets last night, and sustained light contusions about the head. Mr. Lefurgey had just left the Hotel Vancouver by the side entrance, and was running out to catch a car. He did not notice an automobile approaching at a rapid pace behind him. GIRL AND MOTHER WERE ABDUCTED

BRUSSELS, Oct. 19.—A sensational motor car abduction has caused much excitement in Brussels. A young traveler named Lewis fell in love with the 16 year old daughter of his employer, a manufacturer named Hadin. The attachment was discovered and Lewis was dismissed.

While the girl and her mother were shopping in a quiet street yesterday they met Lewis, who was waiting in a motor car. Lewis at once jumped out of the car and, seizing the young girl by her arm, pushed her into the car, despite her mother's shrieks.

"Your daughter has said come along; don't worry," he stated to Mme. Hadin, and, taken aback, she also entered the car. They drove quickly into the country, and after a time Lewis ordered Mme Hadin to alight. When she refused he pushed her out, and she was left alone on a strange road at 11 o'clock at night.

Lewis and the girl continued their journey to Alost, where they were discovered. The man was arrested and the girl sent back to her family.

If Lewis is not sent to prison, a marriage will follow, but the Belgian law deals severely with abductors.

WILL PAY VISIT TO THE POPE. MONTREAL, October 19.—It is understood that Archbishop Bruchesi will leave for Rome to visit the pope officially immediately on the close of the plenary council at Quebec. The object of his mission is not known, altho, despite the secrecy of the council, it is understood that there have been lively discussions over the differences between the French-Irish Catholic elements. Probably amongst other things His Grace's visit to Rome is connected with the eucharistic congress to be held here next year.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.—A fatal accident occurred on McGill Street when a salvage wagon hurrying to a fire, was run into by a Street Car. The salvage wagon was upset, in front of another car. Fireman Robert Stearns was thrown off and sustained fatal injuries, his skull being fractured, one arm torn off, and his leg fractured.

A SERIOUS SHORTAGE.

NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 20.—Colin McDonald, Station Master at McKinnon's Harbor was arrested charged with appropriating \$190 belonging to the Intercolonial. McDonald had been in town several days and when arrested offered Policeman McPherson the amount of the shortage, which the latter declined. The shortage was discovered while McDonald was absent from the Station. When arrested, he displayed a big roll of money.

AMERICAN COUNTESS TO MARRY A DUKE

ROME, Oct. 19.—The Countess of Spotteswoode-Mackin has arrived here from Paris for her wedding a fortnight hence to the Duke Deimonte Marigliano, of a very noble Neapolitan family. (The Countess, who was Sallie Britton, a belle of St. Louis, has refused many offers of marriage. Only a few months ago the Countess denied to the New York World's Paris correspondent that she was to marry a former prince of France whose attentions to her were devoted. Miss Sallie Britton's father was James Britton, once Mayor of St. Louis. She was married to James S. Mackin, a New York State Senator, and upon his death went abroad, where she spent much of her time since. She was engaged by Pope Leo XIII. for her charities in the Roman Catholic Church, and became a well-known figure in Paris, London and Rome. Her book, "A Society Woman on Two Continents," attracted attention.

HIS FRANKNESS IMPRESSES JUDGE.

BRANTFORD, October 19.—Because of his general high character and of his straightforward manner in the witness box, Joseph McGuire, a Grand Trunk yardman, was given his liberty today, tho convicted of criminal negligence, which resulted in the death of three workmen near Mount Vernon in October last. McGuire was in charge of a shunting engine which he sent out behind a freight train to assist it up Mount Vernon grade, and failed to protect its return, allowing a London work train to pass through the yards and collide with the yard engine, while the latter was on its way back. In the crash three were killed: Engineer, Fralick and Fireman Burchell, of London, and Fireman Bibbie, of Brantford. The case was tried at the last court, but the jury disagreed. At this court the jury last night returned a verdict of guilty, with strong recommendation to leniency, as McGuire had apparently had too much to do. Accordingly Justice Ladeford this morning suspended sentence and released the prisoner.
