200 YEARS OF PRESBYTERIANISM

PORT JEFFERSON, N. Y., Sept. 8.—The Presbytery of Long Island met at the Setauket Presbyterian church this week and celebrated the two hundredth anniversary of the organization of the first Presbytery in America.

The evening session was a commemorative service. Elder Selah B. Strong delivered a historical sketch of the Setauket Presbyterian Church, which was very interesting.

On May 12, 1022, it was voted at town meeting to give the Rev. William Fletcher \$200 a year for dispensing the word of God among us, said Mr. Strong.

President James D. Moffat, D. D., LL. D., of Washington and Jefferson College, made the closing address of the evening. Mr. Moffat spoke on "Presbyterianism and What It Is."

The original Presbytery was organized in Philadelphia in the spring of 1716. This was the first independent denominational organization in the American colonies. Ten years later the Presbytery became Synod.

"The first church building was erected in 1071. The church was rebuilt in 1705, and is the present edifice of today. One of the most remarkable ministers this church has ever had was the Rev. Zachariah Greene, who served from the year 1707 to 1849. He lived at Setauket after his retirement, and died there at the age of 99 years."
