AMONG the passengers who arrived from Picou yesterday was Mrs. Philip Large, returning from a visit to her daughters at Lunenburg, N. S. MESSRS PEARDON, and Gray, the Marconi telegraph operators who were on the Minto and Stanley last winter, have been transferred to Sable Island for the summer. THE site of the new railway station is beginning to look as if there is a commencement in good style for the erection of the buildings contractor Wallberg is expected to arrive on Friday. A DECIDED improvement has been made in the Armouries within the last few days. The partitions between the Armouries are being removed, making two large rooms for the use of Nos. 1 and 2 Cos. C. A. RALPH and MRS CARR, of Covehead arrived yesterday from Boston. They were among the passengers who left by the steamer Beverly. They transferred yesterday morning at Halifax, and with other passengers came by rail to Picou, thence by the Stanley. It has been decided by the directors of the Charlottetown Driving Park and Exhibition Association to build a new house for cattle on the Exhibition grounds, the house to be closed in from the weather to afford comfortable shelter to the stock exhibited; also a new house for exhibition poultry. It is probable also that a track will be made inside the present race track to afford a proper place for the horses and cattle to be paraded on at Exhibition time. A.; 2nd Regiment; No. 9 Field Ambulance. At a meeting of the Board of Trade held on Monday evening, the contract between the Dominion Government and the Elder Dempster Company of Liverpool, England, re service between Montreal, Charlottetown, Halifax, Bahamas, Massau, Cuba and Mexico was considered. The following resolution was adopted: That when the contract was renewed, the clause making Charlottetown a port of call, would be inserted, and that a request would be made asking for an agent who would let the company know when freight in any quantity is offering. A MEETING of the Queen's County Temperance Alliance was held Tuesday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. Building, Charlottetown, to make arrangements for the election to be held on the 7th of June, next, in order to give the electors of Queen's an opportunity of voting for the repeal of the Scott Act. Notwithstanding this is the busy season for farmers, a large delegation representing various polling divisions in the County were present. Geo. E. Pull, President for Queen's occupied the chair. The spirit of the meeting was hopeful, but little time was indulged in speeches, systematic and definite organization business being the order of the day. Influential men were appointed for each polling division in the County to act as agents on election day, and assist in securing the largest possible vote. Wherever there is a temperance society they are requested to cooperate in this work. The Alliance have issued a manifesto to the electors summing up the reasons why the Scott Act should be repealed in favor of the Prohibitory Act.

Haney. THE Steam Navigation Company are making special efforts this summer to foster and increase travel to this Province. YESTERDAY the police searched premises said to be tenanted by P. C. Brown, on Kent St., near Queen, but did not find any liquor thereon. JAMES CALLAGHAN, who has been serving a three months sentence in the County Jail for violation of the Prohibition Act was released on Monday last. WORK is being commenced on the Bridge approaches and on the road leading thereto. The former when completed promise to make a very beautiful promenade. Rev. H. E. THOMAS, president of the N. Island pigs are being shipped in numbers to Nova Scotia and other points. Some that were awaiting shipment on the Steam Navigation wharf yesterday were most cruelly overcrowded in the boxes in which they were confined. It is mentioned to The Guardian that on the Malpeque Road beyond the end of Great George Street, there are many sharp stones that are very troublesome and also very injurious to horses' feet. It would be a comparatively small task to have these stones removed and if done it would be very much appreciated. SPECULATION is being indulged in regarding the death on Friday night last of John McPhee of Orwell. He was 54 years of age, and his death is alleged to have been caused by whiskey to which he was treated by some young men who brought the liquor to him. At an inquest which was held by Coroner Moore of Eldon, the jury brought in a verdict to the effect that the death was probably caused by the liquor. Strong feeling has been excited by this crime as it is alleged to be of supplying the liquor, and the punishment of the person or persons who supplied it is demanded.
