Bush Fires

PERTH, Western Australia, Jan. 22.—Disastrous bush fires have swept large areas of the southern fringes of the western Australian wheat belt and also many sections in the southwestern portions of the State. One person was killed, many injured and much damage caused by the fires.

FIRE REPORT

Will Study Stock Exchange

Edwards, prominent accountants of the city to bring in a report covering suggestions for the improvement of trading methods on Montreal Stock Exchanges. They will leave shortly for New York to study the system in use in that city.

First Silver Fox Caught In Maine

BANGOR, Maine, Jan. 22.—The first silver fox he had ever seen in the Maine woods in many years of hunting was captured alive yesterday by H. L. Pomeroy, of Carmel. Pomeroy said he had chased the animal for three days and had become exhausted and submitted to capture without a struggle.

Parley Speeches Heard In Alps

(Special to The Guardian) GENEVA, Jan. 22.—Naval conference speeches in London by the King, MacDonald, Stimson and others were clearly received across the Alps here owing to fine sunny weather. Visitors abandoned all winter sports and flocked to the hotels in order to listen to the loud speakers as they began working. Probably the highest place where the King's speech was distinctly heard was at Jungfraujoch more than 13,000 feet in elevation.

Arctic Weather In Middle West

Death And Suffering Caused By Blizzards Which Howled Across Plains And Mountains.

(Special to the Guardian) CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Waves of Arctic weather rolled southward over the Middle West today from Canada and sent the mercury below the zero mark. From the far northwest to the Great Lakes and south into Texas, blizzards howled across plains and mountains.

Ten Children Killed When Train Hits Bus

(Special to the Guardian) BEEBE, Ohio, Jan. 22.—Ten children were killed today when the bus that was bearing them to school was crushed at an unguarded crossing by a New York Central Railroad train. The driver of the bus also lost his life. Only a child a girl escaped death.
