

WOODSTOCK ALMOST IN RIOT OVER CIRCUS ROW

Call For Militia But Col. Dibblee Refuses to Order Troops--Alleged Short Changing by a Ticket Seller Leads to Big Fight.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., July 15.—The visit of Cole Brothers' circus to Woodstock recently will be remembered as one of the most exciting days in its history. A serious row on the grounds at the time of the afternoon performance, a battle between circus employes and townpeople in which tent pins were reported to be used and several constables were injured the swearing in of special police and the forbidding of the night performance were outstanding features and when it was added that efforts were made to get the militia out of that failing this, some fifty townsmen armed with rifles and revolvers gathered near the circus grounds until dispersed by the sheriff, the lively nature of the incidents of the day will be understood.

One circus employe was arrested, Constable Harry Johnston is in the hospital. There was talk of having the riot act read but later the trouble subsided and the circus was allowed to leave town for Fredericton. A circus employe named Allan is believed to have struck Johnston and at the latest report last night he had not been located.

In anticipation of possible trouble, it was deemed advisable at a meeting of the county council on Monday night to swear in eleven special constables for today inasmuch as it was feared that the employes of Cole Brothers' circus might make trouble. "SHORT CHANGING" COMPLAINED OF.

The parade took place at noon and made a favorable impression. This afternoon, however, complaint was made by several that a ticket seller was not giving the right change back and Harry Johnston, one of the special constables, told the ticket seller that he must refrain from cheating. The row then started.

It is said that one of the bosses whistled for his men who appeared with iron pins, etc. Johnston was hit on the head with a pin and had to be removed to the hospital. Citizens assisted the constables and several were injured on both sides among the constables being Johnston, Bam Niles and Stanley Hamilton. The constables arrested three circus men. The show, with a big crowd in attendance, was in progress but no one was allowed in or out after the fight

started. Twenty-one other special policemen were immediately sworn in as things looked bad for a time, but there was no more row. Mayor Balmain, Clerk Hartley and Chief Kelly called upon the show at 7 o'clock and told the management to hand over Allan, the man who assaulted Johnston, and the evening performance could go on. The reply was that would not be done and that the show would leave for Fredericton at 10.30. The gates of the park where the tents were pitched, were then closed by the authorities and there was no performance.

Major Good telephoned to the D. O. C. asking permission to call out the militia but could get no reply. The militia authorities had a meeting and decided that the militia could be called out if the riot act was read. At 8.30 the militia were gathered in the armory intending to march to the trotting park. Half an hour later Mayor Balmain called on Lieut. Col. Dibblee, in command of the militia with a requisition signed by the police magistrate and two justices of the peace, setting forth that a state of riot was practically existing and asking that the troops be called out.

Col. Dibblee, however, decided against the request saying that if a riot had existed all was then peaceful. Meantime the circus management

had engaged Hon. W. P. Jones to look after their interests. While all was going on, however, a number of town people, perhaps fifty, had armed themselves with rifles and revolvers and gone to the park, but on the order of the high sheriff and his notification that the trouble was over, they went away. No sign of Allan had been secured at last reports, but the chief of police has wired Fredericton that if the man is on the night train to arrest him. The circus was permitted to leave town and the first train at 9.45 for Fredericton, the others to follow later.

BOLD ROBBERY

O.C.B. MAIL SHOPS

SHERBROOKE, July 15.—A daring robbery of registered letters from the mail car on the Quebec Central train on the Magantic branch is reported. On Wednesday afternoon about five o'clock, while at Tring Junction Mail Conductor Lemieux locked the door of his car and went to have some lunch as usual before the train started. Upon his return a few minutes before the train left he found that the door of the car had been forced, but everything inside seemed as usual. However, upon going over the registered letters he found that two were missing, one addressed to M. Lemay, Lake Megantic, containing \$210, and one addressed to Mr. Joseph Cloutier, St. Ephem, containing \$600. Upon making a search he found in a pigeon-hole the one addressed to Mr. Cloutier, but there was no trace of the other. Mr. Lemieux then remembered having been approached by two individuals who were left for lunch and who spoke to him. He had his suspicions aroused regarding them, and as they were aboard the train he telegraphed to the Chief of Police of Megantic, who went to St. Evariste and arrested them when the train arrived there. On one of the men the sum of \$783 was found. Investigation is now being carried on in regard to the affair.

DESPAIRED OF GAINING SHORE

ST. JOHN, July 15.—W. J. Bowen and Miss B. Genevieve Baird, members of the Daniel Ryan Co., narrowly escaped death by drowning while boating on the Basin at Digby, Sunday afternoon. It seems the two obtained a small row boat shortly after luncheon, intending to spend the afternoon on the water. An oar was lost soon after their setting out and the boat drifted helplessly about in a strong tide until rescued and taken in tow by two boys.

Mr. Bowen and Miss Baird had, it is said, given up all hope of ever reaching land again when help arrived. They were soaked through with water and expressed themselves as having no desire to ever again repeat the experience of the previous half hour.

Miss Baird is a native of St. John and enjoys much popularity among the theatregoers of the Maritime Provinces.

SENSATIONAL SHOOTING IN R.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 15.—Standing within a few feet of the spot where a little more than two years ago, he shot and killed his aged father-in-law, Dr. James Weddell Simpson, a dentist of New York, was shot and probably mortally wounded today by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Bartley T. Horner, the woman he made a widow. Dr. Simpson's wife, from whom he has been estranged for many months, was near when the shot was fired, but she did not witness the shooting. Upon learning that it was her husband who had been wounded she refused to go near him and Dr. Simpson had to crawl to a house two hundred feet away to have his wound attended to. Mrs. Horner was arrested and held in \$5,000 bail. Dr. Simpson with the assistance of two friends, made his way to Roosevelt hospital in New York.

The bullet lodged in his liver and an immediate operation was performed to take the bullet out. The doctors said tonight that Dr. Simpson has only a small chance of recovery.
