CANADIAN TRADE FIGURES.

Of the 381 millions of Canadian import and export trade for last year there was a slight preponderance of exports over imports, the exports being \$191,894,783 and the imports \$189,021,516. But it is interesting to note that in several of the Provinces the imports largely exceeded the exports. This was the case in Ontario, where the excess of imports was 15 millions, and in Quebec and Manitoba, in each of which Provinces the imports were about three millions in excess. In Nova Scotia, on the contrary, the exports were about two millions over the amount of the imports, in New Brunswick 7½ millions, in British Columbia 7 millions, in P. E. Island \$300,000 and in the Northwest and Yukon Territories nearly six millions.

The average rate of duty paid on imported dutiable goods throughout the Dominion was 27.68 per cent. In Ontario and the Northwest the duties paid were less than this average, while in the Maritime Provinces the average was considerably more, showing that we import more largely in proportion than the western country does of those goods which pay a high rate of duty. This is a point to which attention ought to be given by Hon. Mr. Fielding in any readjustment of the tariff which may hereafter be made. The actual average duty paid by Ontario on dutiable goods last year was 26.12 per cent; by Quebec 27.92; by Nova Scotia 34.14; by New Brunswick 32.05; P. E. Island 43.45; British Columbia 33.12, Manitoba 23.13 and by the Northwest and Yukon 24.59 per cent.

It will be seen that the average rate of duty paid by P. E. Island was much higher than any other Province. It does not follow, of course that we paid this high rate on all the dutiable goods consumed in the Province. If that were true the conditions would be hard indeed. The figures we have quoted apply to direct importations on which duties were paid at the custom houses in this Province. Much of the dutiable merchandise consumed in P. E. Island is imported and the duty first paid by importers in other Provinces. After making all due allowance for this it strikes us as still remarkable that the average rate of duty actually paid within the Province should be 43.45 in P. E. Island and but 23.12 in Ontario. We fear the big inland Province is in some way getting the better of us under the present tariff.

Messrs. Prowse Bros. & Crowell met their recent heavy loss by fire in Sydney with cheerful courage. They will build again better than before and intend to have their brick block finished by Christmas. Such hopeful energy is altogether admirable.

At a public dinner in his honor at Chicago the other day Sir Thomas Lepton announced that if in the meantime no other British challenger appeared he would again challenge for the America cup with Shamrock III. The announcement was received with tremendous cheering. Among other things Sir Thomas said, "I believe I have loosened the nails by which that old cup has been so long and so firmly held down."

No doubt the dissolution will follow pretty closely on the close of the session. The Liberals of Ontario will then have completed a thirty years term of power. Years ago when Mr. Meredith was leader of the Opposition in Ontario he raised the battle cry, "It is time for a change." It will be interesting to note whether the people feel that way now. The last Dominion election gave a considerable Conservative majority in the big Province and it will not be surprising if the provincial elections go the same way this time.

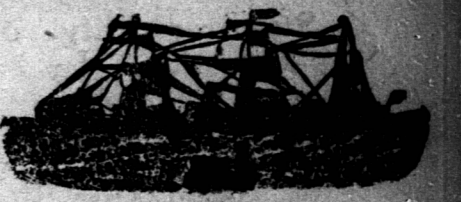
