S. S. CITY OF GREENT arrived in port last evening at 10 o'clock.

The steamer Stanley left Pictou yesterday to supply the light houses.

The body of Captain McDonald of Summerside who was drowned a few days ago in Pictou harbor has not yet been found.

Rev. W. H. WARREN, of Montague, P. E. I., has been supplying the pulpit of Baptist church, Isaac's Harbor, the last two Sundays.

WORK, on the Cape Tormentine pier, which has been stopped since the 30th of June, will be resumed early in August.—Sackville Tribune.

A COMMITTEE meeting of the City Council was held last night. One of the matters discussed was a new building for the City weigh scales.

Local Council.—A meeting of the Local Council of Women will be this Friday evening in the Y M C A. Parlor at half-past seven o'clock, at which the reports of the delegates to the National Council in St. John will be given. A full attendance is particularly desired.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade held yesterday morning Messrs Horace Hazard, G. D. Longworth and John Messervey were appointed delegates to the Maritime Board of Trade at Sydney on August 20th. It was also decided to ask Harbor Master Small for a report upon the Railway wharf. The location of the new station was informally discussed but no decision was arrived at.

A HALIFAX despatch of July 30th says:—L. L. Gullivan of Sydney, real estate and stock broker, was arrested here today on a warrant from Sydney charging him with absconding and embezzlement. L. E. Prowse, of Prowse Brothers & Crowell, laid the information, stating that he had given Gullivan \$2,400 to invest in a certain stock and that he had fraudulently converted the money to his own use. The creditors are Prowse Bros. & Crowell, \$2,400; Dr. Rice, \$3,000; Dr. Copperthwaite, \$600; employees of the Sydney Record, \$400; Gullivan's stock broking transactions were made through the firm of McCurdy & Co., of this city, who it is said, may have a balance on hand sufficiently large to meet Gullivan's liabilities. He will be taken to Sydney tomorrow.

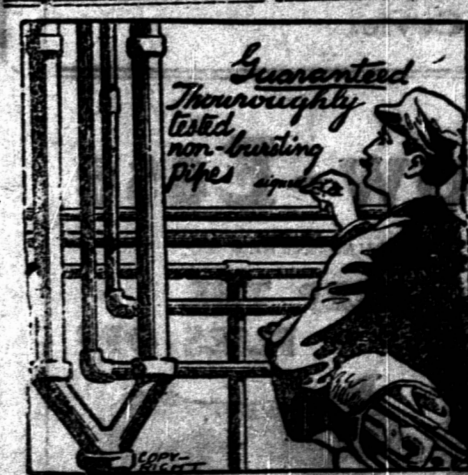
