MR. ROBERT JENKINS' LOSS.
The public throughout the Island are aware that Mr. Robert Jenkins recently suffered a very heavy loss by the midnight fire which destroyed his valuable barns, his large stock of horses, and cattle, with his crops and farming implements and considerable other property. In one hour all the requisites, stores, buildings, stock and implements were swept away. It was a loss which to almost any farmer on the Island would have been felt to be overwhelming and irreparable, especially as but a small part was covered by insurance.

What aggravates the case and makes the loss harder to bear, is the now well established fact that the fire was the act of one or more incendiaries who thus in the most wicked and cowardly manner wreaked vengeance upon Mr. Jenkins by a stealthy midnight attack when he and his family were sleeping peacefully and trustfully in their home. And there is little doubt in most minds that he was thus singled out for villainous attack because, as a temperance man, he had made himself active in repressing the illegal sale of liquors in the section of country where he lives. These conditions not only aggravate the crime, but they give Mr. Jenkins, in his heavy loss, a claim upon the sober and order-loving community throughout the Island.

We write this without the knowledge of Mr. Jenkins. He has asked no one to share his loss or to assist in making it good. He has borne it with a cheerful and uncomplaining fortitude that are beyond all praise, determined to restore his financial position by the same means that he had first gained it—by the industry and energy of his own hands and those of his family. But we feel assured that many will not be willing that he and his family alone shall bear loss incurred on account of his zeal for the public welfare. They will feel that what he has done for the suppression of the liquor traffic was done, not in his own interest, not for any selfish or private ends, but for the public and general good and that it ought to be recognized in a substantial way at the present moment.

There is another aspect of the case. If the enemies of law and order resort to the incendiary torch from motives of revenge the entire community owes it as a duty to make common cause against the criminals not only to bring them to justice, but to show that their crime was futile. This will best be done by making good, at least in large part, the loss in which Mr. Jenkins has incurred. Let it not be said in this fair Island that terrorism and the danger of murderous midnight attack shall make temperance men hesitate to enforce the Canada Temperance Act or the Prohibitory Law. For the time the community stands in danger of such a reign of terror. The remedy is for the law-abiding portion of the community to stand shoulder to shoulder and make common cause against the barn-burners, sharing the losses and assuming an undivided responsibility for the maintenance of the law and the common protection of all.

We hope and trust that in this spirit and animated by a common patriotic purpose a regular organized effort will be made to share in Mr. Jenkins' loss. There are many who will be glad to contribute if once the opportunity is offered them of doing so.

If the Patriot had possessed and exhibited the fairness to wait and permit the convention to decide upon a candidate it might afterward have endorsed the choice thus made to the extent of its limited ability and no one could reasonably have found fault. But fair-minded Liberals cannot forget that the Patriot made most unfair efforts to damage one candidate and force the convention to accept the other. For weeks its columns were loaded down with scurrilous attacks upon Mr. Hazard in which even his private business was assailed. For this unprecedented and most unfair and ungenerous course it has so far made neither apology nor reparation. This makes it extremely difficult for a large section of the party to accept the choice of a convention, so packed with office holders that even Mr. Farquharson was apparently ashamed of its complexion.

SENTENCE OF DISQUALIFICATION.

In the election trial just concluded at Georgetown, Mr. Murdoch McKinnon has been declared elected by a majority of twenty-three votes. It is not this aspect of the judgment, however, that we wish to dwell upon, but the unusual fact that six voters found guilty of corrupt practices have been reported to be disqualified for a term of eight years to come. This is the extreme penalty of the law in that regard, but we feel that the revelations of the trial were such that general public sentiment must endorse the judgment of the Court.

Doubtless there have been other elections, even in Prince Edward Island, that were quite as corrupt as that now under review, but in which the law-breakers have escaped punishment. Doubtless one political party is about as deep in the mud as the other in the mire. But the fact remains that corruption has increased, is increasing and must hereafter be checked with a strong hand if the value of our representative institutions is to be preserved. No greater danger threatens Canada than this spreading cancer of electoral corruption. Men of whatever party who engage in corrupting the electorate with money or whiskey justly forfeit their rights of citizenship and must be classed among the dangerous enemies of our country. The sentence which deprives such persons of the right to vote or to hold office is eminently just and in the public interest.

The law against corrupt practices in elections has too long remained almost a dead letter. We trust that hereafter it will be rigorously enforced so as to become a real terror to evil doers. It is only by the enforcement of the just legal penalties that the gangs of corrupt heelers can be deterred from widening and extending those nefarious practices which they have already reduced to a system. We sincerely hope and trust that the sentence of disqualification against a few of the many sinners in that regard may have a wholesome deterrent effect in our elections hereafter.
