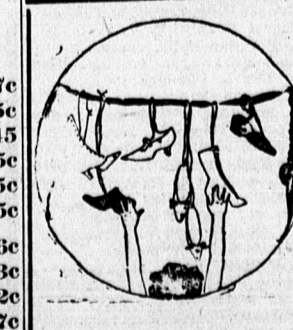

THAT CAR OF YOURS



This is a series of articles pertaining to maintenance and repair of your Automobile. We will be glad to answer through this column questions regarding your car or its mechanism. Send your inquiries to "Automobiles," The Guardian, Charlottetown.

One of the big Oil Companies issued a circular which read this way:—Three quarts of oil in your engine base—add one quart of new oil—result, four quarts of oil. This is a very significant statement, and the phrase should be memorized. Every five hundred miles, drain old oil out of the crank case, and fill with new oil. It is a great investment, and will prolong the life of your engine fifty per cent.

QUEST—My Motor misses at high speed but runs very nicely idling at low speed. Coil has been tested and pronounced O. K. The carburetor is also correct. What can be done to remedy this trouble? O'Leary.

ANS—Your trouble would certainly appear to be in the distributor, unless your valve timing is incorrect, but to go to the easiest point first, clean and adjust the distributor points and gap them .025. I believe this will eliminate your trouble. Be sure also, that the point spring is strong enough to close the points.

QUEST—My carburetor floods and leaks whilst the car is standing. I have tried to get it remedied but cannot.

ANS—There are but three reasons for this trouble which you can check in the following manner:—Float level too high; new inlet seat necessary; sand hole in carburetor casting.

Children Dead; Mother Takes Own Life

BOSTON, June 22—When Percy L. Jones, of Medford, returned home from work, he found the bodies of his wife and three-year-old son locked in a death embrace in the gas filled kitchen of their home. Beside them, huddled in a tiny heap, lay the body of their little tragedy. Assistant Medical Examiner F. T. W.
