THE ROYAL VISIT.

The visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall to Canada is now approaching its close, and we feel assured that it will be fruitful of good results. It has been intensely gratifying to the many thousands who have had the privilege of meeting our future King and Queen. Everywhere the Royal visitors have been received with loving regard and loyal homage. Everywhere they have seen the strongest evidence of the firm attachment of the Canadian people to the Empire and to British institutions.

On their part the Royal visitors must have seen much to interest them and to enlarge their knowledge of the Dominion and its great natural resources. Day after day of rapid railway travel toward the setting sun, followed by day after day rolling eastward, must have impressed them with the vastness of the Canadian heritage, and its importance to the Empire. Canada only began to be seriously valued by British statesmen after the visit of the Prince of Wales forty years ago, and we may rest assured that the visit of his son and heir, and the hearty manner in which they have been received will now enforce the lesson of the the previous visit.

It was confidently hoped and expected that the Royal visit would be free from unpleasant or annoying incidents, and it is satisfactory to note that this expectation has been so far abundantly realized. In all the Provinces visited east and west, by all races, French English, and Indian, by all classes and creeds their Royal Highnesses have been joyfully welcomed. They have been made to feel at home, and have given every evidence of having enjoyed their tour through the Dominion. We doubt not that those pleasant conditions will attend them down to the hour of embarkation.

It is worthy of mention also that among our democratic and independent spirited people, in the closer contact with royalty which the visit has afforded, the Canadian people appear to have been most favorably impressed with the personal qualities of their distinguished visitors. They have adapted themselves to Canadian conditions and have entered into and shared the Canadian spirit. The Duke's replies to the addresses presented him, sometimes made off hand and the tact and amiability displayed on all occasions by the Duke and Duchess alike, have won all hearts and produced at the same time a most favorable impression of the personal gifts and qualities with which they are endowed.

We must all greatly regret that Prince Edward Island has not been included in the Royal tour. A number of our people will see their Highnesses at St. John or Halifax but this will not make good the painful omission of a personal visit to the Island. We trust and hope that before many years the visit to Canada may be repeated and then Prince Edward Island may be honored as the other Provinces have been on the present occasion.

We feel assured that many readers have perused with pleasure the letter of Mr. James Paton descriptive of his recent visit to the Old World. Mr. Paton has made very many trips across the Atlantic is a close observer and possesses the happy faculty of recording his observations in attractive form.

THE MONEY FLOWS IN.

NEW YORK, October 13.—As a result of the annual missionary sermon preached to-day in the Gospel Tabernacle by Dr. A. B. Simpson, the missionary fund solicitor, the sum of \$80,000 was collected during the day. This is an increase of \$20,000 over the collections of last year on a similar occasion. To-day's meetings were the last of the eleven conventions that have been held throughout the United States and the whole amount thus far contributed for missionary purposes is nearly \$175,000.
