THE COOK'S CORNER

PLUM JAM

4 cups (2 lbs.) crushed fruit
1-2 cup water
1-2 cups (3 1-4 lbs.) sugar
1-2 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare fruit, pit about 2 1-2 pounds fully ripe fruit. Do not peel. Cut into small pieces and crush thoroughly. Measure fruit, solidly packed, and water into a large kettle. Stir until mixture boils, cover, and simmer 15 minutes. Add sugar, mix well and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir. Measure sugar and pour quickly. Paraffin and cover at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

PLUM JELLY

4 cups (2 lbs.) juice
7 1-2 cups (3 1-4 lbs.) sugar
1-2 bottle fruit pectin

To prepare juice, crush thoroughly 4 pounds fully ripe fruit. Do not peel or pit. Add 1 cup water. Bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 10 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag; squeeze out juice. Measure sugar and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1-2 minute. Remove from fire, skin, pour quickly. Paraffin and cover at once. Makes about 11 glasses (6 fluid ounces each).

SWANKY SANDWICH

4 cups tomato juice; 1 1-2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca; 1-4 teaspoon dry mustard; Salt and pepper; Whole-wheat toast; Snappy cheese; Bacon, broiled.

Cook the tomato juice with the tapioca until thick and clear. Add mustard, salt and pepper. Spread a slice of toast with cheese and add a little of the sauce, then 2 strips of cooked bacon. Repeat to make a double-decker sandwich.

Salad, apple pie and lots of coffee can complete the menu.

LET CHILDREN SHARE YOUR HARDSHIPS AND BURDENS

Parents Do Wrong In Sacrificing Too Much Just To Give Their Offspring All The Things They Themselves Never Had

Parental love is never so sublime and so idiotic as when fathers and mothers sacrifice their lives in trying to protect their children from the hardships they are forced by circumstances to endure. It is sublime because it is humanity's greatest expression of altruism, and it is idiotic because it defeats its own end and harms those whom it was designed to help. It is easy to see how those who have suffered want to save their children from pain. Easy to understand why the man who had no advantages of education himself starves to send his son to a swanky college. Easy to see why the father who has toiled since childhood, with no luxuries, no vacations, makes play boys and girls of his children. Easy to see why the woman who has never had a pretty dress in her life goes in debt for finery for her daughters. Easy to see why the mother who has always been a household drudge herself will not let her girls spoil their enameled nails by putting their hands in the kitchen, or why the spectacularly presented to us of the sons of poor fathers loafing through college and riding around in sport cars that their old dads are paying for by working sweat and blood on the streets and in the mines, and why the mothers are toiling in the kitchen, and who are fussy about the way that both themselves and the children a great wrong.

When we see these selfish, lazy, dissatisfied, ungrateful children — for after all the Poorman can never give their youngsters all that a Croesus has — we are filled with contempt for them, and wonder why that big, hulking Jones boy doesn't get a job and lift some of the family burden off his father's tired, bent shoulders, and why the Smith girl who has to belong to athletic clubs in order to get exercise, doesn't use some of her muscle by pinch-hitting for her mother over the wash-tub.

CLASSIC TYPE FOR FALL SILKS

Particularly colorful is the pageant of window displays showing the new silks for Fall and Winter wardrobes from a collection that is both distinguished and varied. Women who make clothes for themselves and their families or who have their favorite "little dressmaker" are selecting the classic type silks for their new costumes, and these drapes beautifully and show the line and detail of the garment.

Silk canton crepes which are easily handled and most adaptable for the "good" dresses that show smart lines, come in various weights — heavy enough for the first Fall dress to wear without a coat, and in lighter versions for the dress to wear under coats. Satin-back cantons lead to the luxurious feeling of having satin next to the skin and yet fashion-right on the outside.

The side-saddle drape which appears in this type of fabric is beautifully interpreted in satin because the "fall" of the fabric shows lovely highlights. Fallie weave silks are favored for Autumn and these are particularly easy to handle on the bias as seams do not stretch and the home sewer can turn out a professional looking frock with the minimum of effort. Without a doubt, black leads in the Fall dress parade.

COLOR DOMINATES 1941 FABRICS

In the Autumn fashion showings red is the news. From the blazing red "that stops a fire-truck" to softest American beauty rose, reds are shown in every type of costume. The grayed blues lead, with brilliant "Colorado sky blues" a novelty, and winter navy making quite a play. The olive tones are best liked in greens, with vivid emerald occasionally seen. Orange makes a comeback, and grape and bright purple are both used. Brown is seen more than ever, in shades ranging from palest biscuit to darkest taupe. For volume, of course black is still the favorite, and defies replacement as the standby in the Canadian woman's wardrobe.

As to fabrics, wool runs the gamut from simplest sports to most dramatic evening costumes, soft-surfaced wools preferred. Brushed, fleecy-looking wool is newest. Crepe, both silk and rayon, is almost inevitably showing its velvet attack out in daytime tailcoats as well as evening modes, and mat velvet, with its amazingly dull finish, looks completely new. Lace is palleted for evening, chiffon, solidly headed, or heavy with sequins. Stuff silk damask is occasionally seen for day, and slipper satin much liked for evening. Silk jersey, in varying weights and textures, is still a great favorite.
