New Prov. Sanatorium Was Opened Yesterday

By His Honour Lieutenant Governor Dalton—Commissioner Commended In Addresses For Work Accomplished.

CHURCH ARMY LECTURE

Last evening a most interesting and instructive lecture was given in St. Paul's Parish Hall by Captain S. G. Jackson of the Canadian Church Army. The lecture was illustrated by lantern slides and dealt with many of the phases of the work carried on by the army in England, views of missions in the open and in the homes, of cottages built for the poor by the army, of social work in the slums, of the sea side resort for poor brothers and children run by the army were shown on the screen and explained by Captain Jackson in a most pleasing manner.

The new Provincial Sanatorium was formally declared open yesterday afternoon by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Dalton. The opening was attended by a very large crowd of interested citizens who packed the spacious reception room of the institution and filled adjoining corridors. Mr. Simon Paoli, Sr., Chairman of the Sanatorium Commission gave a comprehensive outline of the work leading up to the construction of the institution. Addresses were also delivered by His Honour Lieut.-Gov. Dalton, Right Rev. Joseph A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown, Premier W. M. Lea, His Worship Mayor Prowse, Judge Fraser, Mr. Justice F. L. Haszard, Mr. George DeBlois, Hon. Dr. McNeill.

The Sanatorium Commission was congratulated on its accomplishment. The work of the Women's Institutes was highly commended by various speakers, as was also the generosity of Mr. George DeBlois who made a munificent contribution to the building fund.

Vocal solos were rendered by Mrs. Kenneth Richards accompanied by Mrs. Keith Rogers, and violin solos were given by Miss Kathleen Hornby, accompanied by Mr. Albert Blanchard.

NO CHANGE IN INTERIM SUPPLY CITY COUNCIL COLLECTION OF BILL PASSED MONTHLY THE SALES TAX IN THE HOUSE MEETING

OTTAWA, Ont., June 8.—The House of Commons this afternoon passed an interim supply bill for \$22,197,847. This represents one twelfth of the main estimates, and one fourth of the amount to be voted under civil government of the Department of Interior. It also covers one twelfth of the amount provided for Canadian National Steamships and Maritime Freight Rates as set forth in the main estimates. One fourth of the amount provided for unemployment relief in the main estimates is also covered in the bill.

Mr. Bennett explained that the reason one fourth was asked for in respect to the Interior Department was, "that large numbers of the staff of the Department are still on full pay under their retirement rights, and therefore it is necessary to provide for one quarter of the amount mentioned in the estimates or there would not be sufficient to meet these demands until the end of this month. The House had two divisions.

J. A. Bradette, Liberal member for Temiskaming, asked Premier Bennett to confirm or deny a statement attributed to Hon. William Finlayson, Ontario Minister of Land and Forests, that the Dominion and Provincial Governments had reached an agreement to send out three survey parties to study the best route for the trans-Canada highway. Deputy Speaker Lavergne ruled the question out of order and Mr. Bradette moved the adjournment of the House to discuss the question. His motion was defeated by 64 to 37. Later, however, the question was discussed on the motion of Mr. Bennett to go into committee of supply. Another division was called when the Deputy Speaker's ruling was again appealed from. This time it was pressed by A. W. Neill, Con., Comox, Alberni, who wanted to discuss unemployment. The Chair ruled that since unemployment was already before the House in the Liberal amendment to the Budget, such a discussion was out of order on a supply motion. The House supported the ruling 64 to 44.

Hijacking Case In Supreme Court

Startling Evidence Given of Open Violation of The Prohibition Law And Alleged Hijacking Activities On Highway Near Summerside.

The Supreme Court continued on Monday morning at Summerside, Mr. Justice Arsenault presiding, with the case of George Gallant, Daniel Gallant and Roy Grady, charged with robbery with violence.

Mr. C. I. McCallum opened the case for the Crown. The first witness called was Placide Gallant, who testified that he had lived in St. Eleanor's for four years as caretaker of a fox ranch. He had known prisoners for some years. He left the ranch at 7:30 p. m. on April 8th, driving a horse and sleigh with the intention of going to Summerside.

"When I left home," witness said, "I had a bag and rug in the sleigh. When I came to the main road I got five gallons of rum in one gallon tin containers from under a bridge. The rum was put there by a man from Grand River. It was my rum. I bought it from this man. I told him to put it under the bridge. It had been there since the last week in November. I paid the man \$50 for it. On April 8th I put it in the sleigh. I intended to sell it to make more money."

Asked by Counsel what he thought he could get for it, witness replied he expected to get \$20 a gallon. It was his intention to sell it wholesale, he said.

When near the seaweed road, witness thought he saw a team and found later that it was three young fellows. When they came near him, Roy Grady, one of the three, jumped on the horse and stopped it and told the other two to search the sleigh. They took the liquor from the sleigh and put it on the ground. Grady, witness alleged, then pushed him off the sleigh and struck him with the buckle of the reins. Grady then turned the horse round and said, "we are going back to get the rest of the rum, if we don't get rum we will get him."

Witness alleged that his assailants forced him to get in the sleigh and got in after him. Witness told them to "be easy on the mare," and Grady told him to mind his own business and said: "We have the whole thing now."

Asked by Counsel if he knew why they were attacking him, witness replied the prisoners said they were doing this for some one else, for a Perry fellow, he thought.

Witness said, he had spoken to a Perry fellow about the rum.

Commissioner Had Busy Day

Yesterday morning Mr. J. A. Stiles, Chief Executive Commissioner of the Boy Scouts Association of Canada was busily occupied in answering correspondence. At noon he addressed the Rotarians. In the afternoon he made a number of visits and at 6 o'clock addressed the Gyo Club at their weekly dinner. At 9 p. m. he had a conference with scout masters, troop leaders and assistant troop leaders in the Baptist Church and initiated them into the proper method of making fire by friction, a necessary accomplishment in scouting.

Right Rev. Joseph O'Sullivan, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown Welcomed In Western Capital Yesterday.

SUMMERSIDE, June 8.—Right Rev. Joseph A. O'Sullivan, D. D., Bishop of Charlottetown, paid his first official visit to St. Paul's Church and Parish. On his arrival at the Parochial House he was cordially welcomed by the Pastor, Rev. J. J. McDonald. A procession was then formed which went in order to the church. In the procession were accompanying clergy, members of the Knights of Columbus and C. M. B. A. lined the street on both sides. The convent children were singing in front of the Church as the Bishop entered. The church which was very tastefully decorated with flowers was filled with a vast congregation to welcome His Excellency.
