(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) BALL AT THE ARMOURIES.—As a fitting wind-up to the first Union meeting of the Maritime Province Lodges of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, which had been in session here since Tuesday, a ball was held in the Armouries last night for the benefit of the visiting brethren, their families and guests. It was a highly enjoyable function. Close on three hundred persons were present. A delightful program of music, consisting of 14 dances, was rendered by the Fourth Regiment Band and by Miss Bessie Blanchard, pianist, and dancing was maintained until an early hour this morning. Refreshments were served. The visitors expressed their delight at the reception given to them by the local lodge of the Brotherhood, the Glad Tidings Lodge.

LAD TO REST.—The funeral of the late Father Stephen P. J. LeBlond, Georgetown, took place yesterday, and was attended by a large number of people from all parts of the Island. In St. James' church, the deceased's last parish, a Pontifical Mass of Requiem was celebrated by His Lordship, Bishop O'Leary, assisted by Dr. J. C. McMillan as Deacon, and Father Boderaut as sub-deacon. Nearly all the priests of the Island were present in the church. The sermon for the occasion was preached by Rev. Dr. McLellan, in which he spoke very highly of the virtues of the deceased Father, extolling his long and useful life in a masterly and eloquent sermon. The body of the late Father was interred in the Georgetown cemetery beside that of the late Father Daniel McDonald. When the body was being removed from the train at Georgetown on the previous day, the Fourth Regiment Band thoughtfully played the Dead March while the large number of spectators stood with uncovered heads.

COUNTY COURT JUDGES ARE TO RETIRE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—The operation of the new amendment to the Judges' Act will call for the retirement in a short time of ten judges of county courts. Eight of them are in Ontario. The act as amended last session provides that a county court judge on reaching seventy-five years of age shall retire from the bench. He will be entitled, however, to full pay. No special notification has been sent out to the judges affected, but there is reason to believe that they are fully aware of the new provisions, and, in all cases, are quite ready to abide by them. In Ontario there are now four county judgeships vacant, or twelve in all, making allowance for automatic retirements. The number of aspirants is fully equal to the number of vacancies. The new law does not apply to supreme court judges, who, however, may retire voluntarily after so many years' service and receive full pay. If they choose to do so, Sir John Boyd and Mr. Justice Britton are now eligible to avail themselves of this provision, but it is not intimated that they have any intention yet of taking that course.
