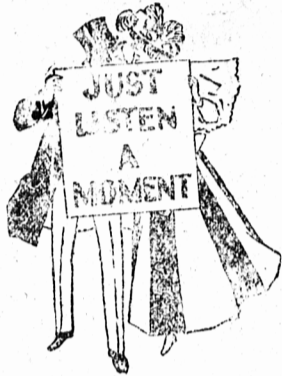

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL N.B. & P.E.I. CONFERENCE

The Ministerial Session Opened in Central Methodist Church, Moncton--Roll Call--Transfers--Supernumerary List.

The ministerial session of the twenty-fifth annual conference of N.B. & P.E.I. opened in the Central Methodist Church, Moncton, at 8 o'clock on Tuesday June 16th, 1908.

The president Rev. James Crisp, occupied the chair--Hymn 54 was sung, and after the reading of the fourth chapter of Ephesians by the secretary, Rev. Matthew R. Knight, Revs. Dr. G. M. Campbell and W. W. Lodge offered prayer.

The General Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Carman being present, was called to the chair and presided during the session.

The Roll was called and 46 ministers answered to their names.

The president reported the transfer of Rev. Dr. Flanders from Montreal Conference into N.B. & P.E.I. Conference and that of Rev. Wm. Spargo from N.B. & P.E.I. Conference into Day of Quinte Conference.

It was recommended that Rev. Joseph Parkin, who held a supernumerary relationship last year be restored to the active work provided a suitable circuit is available for him.

THAW WILL REMAIN IN THE TOMB

NEW YORK, June 16. — Harry K. Thaw will remain in the Poughkeepsie jail pending an application of his counsel to Justice Dowling of the supreme court, for a change of the order committing him to the state hospital for the insane at Bartlett.

This decision was rendered by Justice Morschauer, of Poughkeepsie, after hearing arguments of counsel in this city today on a motion to transfer Thaw to any state asylum other than an asylum for insane convicts. Col. Franklyn contended that Thaw could legally be transferred to any other state hospital for the insane and asserted that Thaw would personally rather be in the Tombs or Poughkeepsie prison than in Matteawan.

District Attorney Jerome said that he personally had no objection to the transfer of Thaw to some other hospital if he were convinced that it was for Thaw's own good. Justice Morschauer stated that he could not object to Justice Dowling's order sending Thaw to Matteawan, but in a few of the statements that Thaw might not recover there because of the feeling he has toward the head of the institution he would stay the execution of the order committing him until such time as Thaw's counsel could ask Justice Dowling for a change of the original order.
