Double Drowning

LOWER SAULNIERVILLE, N.S., May 30 (By the Canadian Press)—Tragedy struck at this Digby County village over the week end and this morning the bodies of Dereme Comeau, 35, of this place, and Arcade Comeau, 32, a resident of Meteghan station, were taken from the waters of Beaver Lake. An overturned dory, found by two companions of the drowned men on a fishing expedition, told the story of their deaths before the bodies were actually discovered.

Dereme and Arcade Comeau, with Elie Comeau, brother of Dereme, and Walter Saulnier left by motor launch for Beaver Lake last evening. Dereme and Arcade took the dory to fish near the mouth of a small brook while Elie and Saulnier made camp at a shack some distance from the shore. When the two fishermen fell from the water their companions did not worry, as several other huts were available where they might spend the night. This morning Elie Comeau and Saulnier went down the lake in the launch, and found the overturned dory. Nearby they discovered Arcade Comeau's floating body. Dereme's corpse was discovered at the bottom of the lake in six feet of water.

A Coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death.
