The Hen House Episode Recalled

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Feb. 17.—Rough surface of the hen-house of Mrs. E. F. Hoggood, of Cape Wolfe, P. E. I., by a shell from the Customs revenue cutter, Arras, has been the subject of formal enquiry, Hon. Alfred Duranleau, Minister of Fisheries, told the House of Commons today. This incident occurred when the Arras was pursuing fishermen who were illegally catching lobsters last year.

The proceedings of the enquiry will be tabled in the House, if a request for such is made, the Minister said.

Liquor Ship Is Freed

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 17.—(A.P.)—The United States circuit court of appeals today ordered the British auxiliary schooner "Miss C. B." returned to her owners because she was not within an hour's sailing distance of shore when captured by a coast guard cutter with a liquor cargo aboard.

Records showed the "Miss C. B." was captured in March 1932, outside the 12-mile limit after a chase which started inside the limit. "There is neither allegation in the libel nor proof in the record that the "Miss C. B." was ever within one hour's sailing distance of shore," Judge Rufus E. Foster said in his opinion. The Southern Alabama district court condemned and forfeited 1,997 sacks of assorted liquors and 1,250 gallons of alcohol.

SUMMERSIDE FIRE DEPT. WORKING FOR SHIELD—It will be of interest to the public to know that the Summerside Fire Dept. is making good progress in their annual competition for the National Chamber of Commerce shield. This competition is sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce through the local Board of Trade. Last year the shield was won by the Kentville, N. S., fire dept., with the Summerside dept. second in their class. The classes of competition are arranged so that all towns of the same sized population are competing together. The purpose of the competition is to reduce fire losses throughout the country from year to year. This is accomplished by a program of fire prevention education as well as by the promotion of efficiency in fire depts. Addresses on fire prevention are given to different organizations, fire inspections by local fire depts, fire drills and a Fire Prevention Week which is observed nationally, are the methods used to impress upon the public the importance of fire prevention. When we consider that in 1930 fire losses in Canada were \$48,000,000 the importance of this work is realized. During the past year the local dept., have sponsored talks to the Boy Scouts and have conducted inspections for fire purposes in conjunction with the fire marshal in addition to the regular fire drills. Our fire losses since June 1932 have been approximately \$120000 which bears out the old adage, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Through the courtesy and co-operation of the Street Dept., the snow has been kept cleared from Water St., which will allow the motor chemical to answer calls to any part of the business section without delay. With the co-operation of the public the dept. hope to bring the shield to Summerside this year.—S

PAYS TRIBUTE TO GRAHAM

Senate Railway Committee Head Lauded By Hon. Mr. Meighen.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—Tribute to Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, who is chairman of the Senate Railway Committee, was voiced today by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Government leader in the Senate, at the close of the committee's deliberations which saw that body place its imprimatur on the railway legislation. At the same time, Senator J. P. B. Casgrain expressed to Mr. Meighen the appreciation of the committee for the Government leader's part in piloting the measure to that stage.

"This committee has been engaged for many weeks on what is undoubtedly the most important legislation that has come before either House for years," said Mr. Meighen. "It was legislation that very clearly and emphatically required careful discussion by the committee. It was legislation that lent itself to committee work in a peculiar way, and I only speak what I know has been the general verdict of this committee when I say that the committee has gone about its task from day to day as a committee ought to do."

"There has never appeared at any moment an expression which indicated other than a desire on the part of every member of the committee to meet the public demands and to serve the public to the best of its capacity. But I rose chiefly to say that we are indebted for the atmosphere that has surrounded the committee's work, for the spirit that has prevailed, for the expedition that we have been able to bring to bear, principally to the chairman of

"JOHN LAW" TOO MUCH FOR BANDITS

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 17.—(A.P.)—With machine guns blazing a saccato that stifled defiant pistols, the law today caught up to the elusive Willie Ferguson bank robbery gang.

Tonight, Ferguson's body is in the city morgue, and the three men who earlier helped him kidnap the cashier of the First National Bank at suburban Ambler and flee with \$37,200 were under arrest.

The captured three, survivors of an exciting gun battle, were questioned about six additional bank robberies, three in Southern New Jersey and three in Philadelphia.

The gang was cornered in a hide-out less than an hour after racing from Ambler, by detectives who lay in wait—unaware of the four's latest escapade. A large sum of money in two travelling bags, was found in the raided house in north west Philadelphia. It was reported more than \$50,000, and was believed by police to include the proceeds of several holdups.

Killer Gets Life Sentence

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 17.—(A.P.)—Robert B. Jonah, 19, who admitted he slew his foster parents but said he did it to end their suffering, was sentenced to life imprisonment today in superior court. Jonah suddenly changed his plea from not guilty to guilty of a charge of murder. Jonah killed his foster parents by beating them with a hammer and slashing them with a razor. He said he killed Mrs. Jonah because she was suffering from a cancer and her husband because he did not want him to suffer from the loss of his wife.
