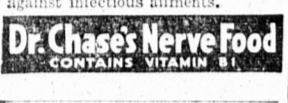

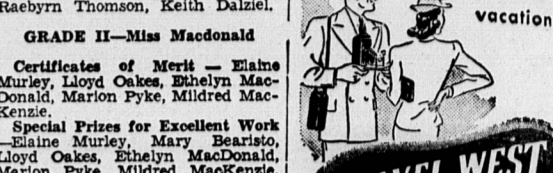

NARCOTIC EDUCATION IN COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS

President George Barton O'Brien of Colgate University, in his vocation address, September, 1939, presented some important facts to his students, which are here repeated by his kind permission: "If beverage alcohol were totally removed from the world, the result would be complete gain."

Everything an trying to build up as an educational, alcoholic drinking tends to tear down... Alcohol unbalances the judgment and disorganizes the emotion. The natural results of a college education of consuming beverage alcohol are represented by divergently opposite poles. To be consistent, I should either surrender any thought of being an educationalist, or endeavor to eliminate the drinking of alcoholic beverages - the two don't blend.

Alcohol destroys mentality at first temporarily, and by continued increased doses this deterioration becomes permanent. Alcohol is a potent cause of crime and immorality. It unbalances the judgment and disorganizes the emotions. Alcohol is a poison and should be ceased. The effects of alcohol are most injurious to the young. It raises the temperature, it really lowers it; no alcohol is given in polar expeditions. It lowers the blood pressure, it causes a higher death rate in pneumonia and tuberculosis, deactivates the tissues and there it makes the body more susceptible to disease. Alcohol has no unique value in internal medicine, and no surgical care to operate on an alcoholic, for his chances of recovery are much reduced.

"Man as analyzed in our laboratories is worth about ninety-eight cents. He is worth about one cent more than enough to whitewash a chicken-coop, phosphorus enough to cover the heads of a thousand matches, and is not so much you see. It is the brain that counts, but in order that your brain may be kept clear you must keep your body fit and well. That cannot be done if you take liquor." - Dr. Chas. Mayo.

OUR DOMINION IN A NEW PEACE ERA!

"Nations cry for Peace," said a clerk, "but the only peace that is plished in a day nor by signing papers. We need good Home Life, less outside interests, more discipline and straight up parents. Parents must realize their responsibilities; improve Homes before we start making for a World Peace."

Said a Leader: "we are not living in the Dark Ages, but in the Twentieth Century.
