CADET INSPECTIONS—Advice has been received from Halifax that the annual examinations of the physical education classes at the Prince of Wales College and Normal School will take place here on the 5th and 6th of May. The Physical education certificate is necessary for teachers in the schools of the Province and this year 161 men and 110 ladies, will present themselves for examination. This figure represents a slight increase over the attendance at last year's examination. The course now concluding started in October, and was conducted by a physical training instructor provided by the Department of National Defence. Immediately following these examinations the annual inspections of the cadet corps at Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University will be carried out, while the remaining Charlottetown Cadet Corps will not be inspected until June. The early closing of Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's makes an early inspection necessary for those cadet corps.

SPEECH ON BUDGET BY MR. L. R. ALLEN

Summerside Member Claims Province Is Now "Dry" and That Prohibition Promises Of Lea Government Have Been Fulfilled.

Speaking in the Budget debate in the Provincial Legislature on April 24, Mr. L. R. Allen, 5th District of Prince, complimented the Speaker and joined with the other members in expressing regret at the illness of the present Speaker. He made complimentary reference to the former leader of the Government, now Mr. Justice Saunders, also the present Premier. It was only proper that a farmer should be leader of the House. It had been anticipated that his conducting of the House would not be up to the average but he had got along without any serious mistakes.

If Mr. Sharpe, newly elected member for Second Prince carried into this House his high standard of citizenship, the Speaker believed he would be an acquisition indeed.

In nearly all departments the present Government had made radical improvements. Mr. Allen insisted. He instanced ferry boats, bridges, roads, etc., as being left in a neglected condition by the Conservative Government. Delegations had come to him, Mr. Allen, saying that the roads had been neglected for twenty years.

Dr. MacMillan: "The Stewart Government wasn't in for twenty years."

Mr. Allen replied that the Stewart Government had been in long enough to improve conditions.

He paid a compliment to the Speaker whose great grandfather's portrait hangs over the Speaker's chair. He also praised the Lea Government's house-keeping, especially its improvements to Prince County. This year not so much criticism was being heard about the Prince County Jail.

Dr. MacMillan: "They're getting lots of groceries."

Mr. Allen: "The groceries were served in sufficient quantities, so that the prisoners will live long enough to serve their sentences."

Dr. MacMillan: "Under the Ticket of Leave Act?"

Mr. Allen: "The Ticket of Leave Act does not exist. Why talk about an Act that has not come into existence?"

Resuming the debate on Monday afternoon Mr. Allen commended the road work carried on under the Liberal regime, both generally and with regard to his own district. The car owners were appreciative of this work. The tax on automobiles had

operation at the earliest possible season. The speaker went over the items of bridges, road gravelling, etc. If the Opposition can find anything in the Revenue and Expenditure columns that should not be there he would like to know what it was. The Opposition was trying to find something on which to catch the Government, but they had not found very much. He quoted from the reports of the Public Account Committee of 1925 and compared this statement with the Public Accounts of last year. Using the arguments of the Opposition leader in 1925 the interest today would be \$84,202, making a difference of \$9,610 in this Government's form.

The enforcement of Prohibition Act had been criticised to some extent but not to any great extent. Government Control had "had its day and ceased to be." Prohibition is the law and if the Government had a little more support from the Opposition and less destructive criticism it would be better.

"We have no convictions today because we have no offenders," Mr. Allen said. "The place is dry. They say there are a few airplanes carrying booze but that is a matter of the Custom authorities."

Dr. MacMillan: "Any convictions in Summerside last year?"

Mr. Allen: "Oh yes."

Dr. MacMillan: "How many?"

Mr. Allen: "You should know?"

Dr. MacMillan: "I do know, I am asking you if you know."

The Opposition, Mr. Allen contended, criticised the Government for convictions, and criticised them if there were no convictions.

Continuing he said, that recently in another Province a car load of liquor met a delegation going up to the Government asking for financial relief. This was the situation under Government Control. He cited convictions for illegal selling of liquor in other Provinces.

Dr. MacMillan: "Tell us about that woman in Summerside."

Mr. Allen: "You might know more about it than I do."

Dr. MacMillan: "You don't know much about Summerside, do you?"

Mr. Allen: "I am talking about Government Control in other Provinces."

One thing the Government was receiving credit for, Mr. Allen continued, was the organization of the provincial police. Concluding "he said that "before March 1st" the Government would appeal to the county. The Liberal Administration stood for progress; the Opposition stood for stagnation.

JUDGMENT SAYS SALTS CAUSED COWS TO DIE

TORONTO, April 29.—The salt of saltpetre incorrectly labelled as mineral salts by a Queensville storekeeper, W. A. Burkeholder, to district farmers caused the death of six cows in the period January to March, 1930. Subsequent action by the six farmers resulted in court judgments against Burkeholder on six actions for a total sum of \$639.35 as compensation for the loss of the cows.

Burkeholder purchased the salts from the York Trading Co. Ltd., Toronto, and he now sues that company in non-jury county court before Judge O'Connell for \$1,000 as compensation for his liabilities and for his alleged loss of business prestige.
