LIBERALS ARE SCORED BY CITIZENS AND SOLDIERS.

OTTAWA—Some people in Canada want conscription and some people don't. Sir Robert Borden has received a copy of a resolution unanimously adopted at a representative gathering of 1500 citizens and returned soldiers recently held in the City of Vancouver under the auspices of the Great War Veterans' Association. In part, this read:

"Whereas certain delegates professing to be representative of British Columbia, in a political convention held at Winnipeg, upheld resolutions which are abhorrent to the loyal citizens of Vancouver, and whereas such views, if carried out in a new election would be an added hardship to our men fighting at the front a menace to the Empire and a delay to a victorious peace: Therefore, we the citizens of Vancouver, pledge ourselves anew to conscription, and repudiate and condemn any individual or party whose political ambition or desire is greater than the loyalty which should be the first and last thought of every good citizen in this hour of hardship and peril."

The Other Side.

The Premier is not the only one who has received an expression of feeling on this question. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Frank Oliver have also received a communication on the subject. In this case, it is a demand that conscription be not put into effect until the people of the Dominion have endorsed it by means of a referendum. It is signed by fifty-five residents of Senalia, Alberta, whose attitude on obligatory service may best be gauged by the names of the majority of those making the demand, some of which follow:

REMARKABLE PROPHECY OVER 200 YEARS OLD

Translation of Uncanny Document Found Upon German Prisoner.

TORONTO.—A Toronto business man who has two sons at the front one of whom returned with a shattered shoulder, while the other is at present in England recovering from wounds received in July, has received the following remarkable document from the latter, who states that it is a translation of a German prophecy found among the effects of a prisoner.

PEACE PROSPECTS.

"On a parchment dated 1701 found in a monastery wall at Wismar Marklenberg, the following prophecy is written: 'At a time when the Papal throne's empty Europe will be visited with an awful chastisement. The murder of a Prince will start the conflagration.

'Seven nations will rise against a Bird with one head and a Bird with two heads. A noble from the Central Country who mounts his horse from the off-handside will be led from victory to victory.

'There will be a great struggle in the East and in the West. Troops will dart by without horses. Fiery dragons will fly through the air spitting fire and brimstone. Towns and villages will be destroyed and humanity will look on helpless.

'Tumult will last for three years. The time will come when no man will buy or sell and when bread will be marked and allotted.

'Oceans will redder with blood, and men will be under the sea and wait they prey.

'The people of the seven will fall upon those of the Land and the vanquish will tremble and quake. Still they will not remain utterly crushed but will endure to the end.

'The War will begin when the corn ears are swelling. When the cherry blooms the third time will the heat of the battle be fiercest, and peace will be signed finally at the coming of Christmas.'

GEN. ROOP VISITS TEXAS RANCH

Pays High Compliment to American Troops; Entertained at Barbecue.

The following clipping is taken from the El Paso Herald as the reference to Dr. C. C. Young's ranch will be of interest to his many friends in this Province:—

'The present revolution in Russia is similar to the French revolution,' said Lieut. Gen. Vladimir H. Roop, chief of the Russian military commission to the United States, before he left El Paso Wednesday for San Antonio, Texas. 'The new government of Russia is organized on democratic principles. Religion and social positions of our people are not taken into consideration now. These things make no difference with the new Russia.'

Gen. Roop received a Herald reporter in his private car, 'New York,' before he departed for San Antonio on the Sunset limited Wednesday morning. Gen. Roop was accompanied by Maj. N. K. Averill, Ninth cavalry, his aid, Capt. Cornilly Schutt and William Arnold Landvoigt. Gen. Roop would not announce his itinerary farther than San Antonio. We were in the Russian military uniform, khaki blouse with blue trousers and Russian military boots.

Was Carpathian Commander.

'I was commanding the second army corps in the Carpathians when the czar abdicated,' he said. 'Of course the army was astonished by the internal affairs in our nation, but they learned that a new government was to be established on democratic principles. There was no demoralization whatsoever. The Russian army is going to continue through with her allies and fight to the end.'

Kerensky is "Iron Man."

'Like other nations in a similar situation, Russia needs a strong man, a man with an iron hand, and I know we have this sort of a man in our premier Kerensky. He is organizing both the people and the soldiers in such a way that he will make the new Russia a success. Of course, in a situation such as Russia is now placed in, he must co-ordinate the people. The difficulty is that the people can not realize the difference between liberty and their former situation. This must come to them gradually, and it will.

Gen. Roop and party said repeatedly that on their whole trip they had had no more delightful social entertainment than the barbecue and musical at Dr. C. C. Young's ranch home at Belen, Texas, Tuesday night. The guests were taken down the valley in the early evening, with the moon shining brightly, and entertained with music and light refreshments until the barbecue was ready. A military motorcycle escort was provided by Gen. Bell and Col. Jackson of the 34th infantry, kindly sent the regimental band to furnish music out of doors at the ranch.

On the arrival of the Russian party the band played the Russian national hymn, followed by the "Stars Spangled Banner" while all stood at attention. On entering the house, Gen. Roop immediately became enthusiastic about the wonderful collection of rich rugs from central Asia which Dr. Young possesses. Gen. Roop went from room to room examining the rugs and in each case told instantly the very town and province from which the rugs came.

Informal Entertainment.

Dr. Young met the general with traditional hospitality, offering him the bread of friendship and other tokens of good will. An hour was spent in conversation and listening to music, and then the guests were seated around a large table and an elaborate dinner was served, delicious and unusual. The main dish was barbecued Krakul lamb, four of the lambs having been brought down from the
