ST. JOHN'S HARBOR BLOCKED WITH ICE

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 2.—St. John's harbor and the whole eastern coast is now blocked with ice, and the Allan Line Pomeranian, now outside the floe, 220 miles off Cape Race unable to enter port until the wind changes: The Donaldson liner Tritonia, from Glasgow to Botwood, from paper, is stranded in floes off the mouth of Notre Dame Bay and in danger of being forced ashore by the pressure of the ice pack.

COL. SAM HUGHES GETS PLUM SON

OTTAWA, May 2.—Major Garnet B. Hughes, son of the Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, has been appointed a resident engineer for Vancouver Island.
