Charley Yates Of Atlanta Shoots Spectacular Golf To Capture British Title

(By SCOTTY RESTON Associated Press Sports Writer) TROON, Scotland, May 29—(AP)—Charley Yates, relying on his heart when his putter wouldn't work, won the British Amateur Golf Championship Saturday by defeating Cecil Erwing of Ireland, three and two, in the 36-hole final, and thus re-established Atlanta as the golfing capital of the United States.

Bobby Jones' cheerful young fellow-townsmen won it on the 34th green, and on this green, as indeed on almost every green, both his heart and his putter were in good shape.

Erwing a stubborn and lion headed player who defeated Canada's Sandy Somerville in the semi-finals, had out Yates' lead to two. In a last desperate effort he emptied out of the sand and dropped his putt for a par 5. Yates, after three picture shots, was on the 34th green in three, eight feet from the pin.

The crowd of 7,000 fought for positions around the green. When they finally fell silent he tugged at his cap and looked over the line once. Here, then, the little boy whom practically everybody had overlooked stood needing an eight-foot birdie putt for what was to all intents and purposes, the World's Amateur Golf Championship.

When he addressed his ball, only two things could be heard—the washing of the sea on the nearby shore and the singing of skylarks overhead. It was a fit setting for the putt that was to come.

Yates struck the ball squarely into the cup, and the silence abruptly was broken by a terrific yell. Yates decided tonight that his new, fast putting stroke was responsible for his success. "I decided when I got here I was gonna miss 'em quick," he said, "and the faster I putted the better I did. I'm not one of these guys who've got no nerves. I've got 'em and when I put fast they don't get a chance."

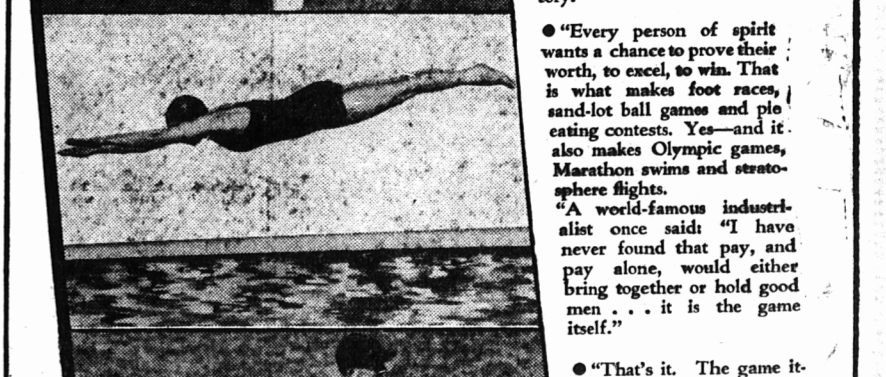
