R. T. Holman of Summerside in a letter to the President of the Board of Trade in answer to an invitation to be present at a meeting Wednesday night says regarding the Canadian Packing Company. "Combination of capital under the name of syndicate, or other associations of enterprising men—who seem to acknowledge at the start an incompetence to stand alone—men who desire to enter the arena of business with the other fellow handicapped, and thus specially favored by the people through their trustees, the Government, should not have Government aid. The socialistic idea of the Government owing and operating all products of land and sea for the material benefit of themselves and the governed would be better than guaranteeing bonds. Although the company now seeking the Government aid in Prince Edward Island, to enable them to develop the pork and beef business are no doubt responsible and worthy gentlemen, it seems ludicrous from my standpoint to assume that the Armours, who could buy the island or could book an order of the British Government, for ten millions of canned meats for South Africa and fill it, would require a letter of credit from the Government of Prince Edward Island to enable them to properly work their business here. * * The undoubted security of the Government is not so important to the people of Prince Edward Island as the position the Government places any one in by endorsing their bonds. I would not favor the scheme, even if the promoters handed the Government a million dollars—placing beyond a question the matter of risk so far as the Government is concerned. We know that Lord Dufferin was pressed into his grave too soon because the promoters had secured some noble lords, by thousands of pounds paid down, to lend their names to the directors. Lord Dufferin was too useful a man to the State to be sacrificed but he was not so important as all the people even of little Prince Edward Island. I do not mean that the company now operating the Government of F. E. Island would operate adversely to the interest of the people,—but the door would be left more than ajar for them to do so."

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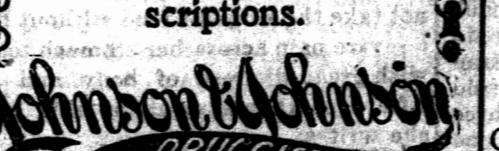
