SECRETARY'S REPORT

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Secretary, reported that the activities of the Society during 1923 despite unfavorable conditions, were successful and encouraging.

He referred to the visits and addresses of the District Secretary, Rev. F. S. Porter, M. A., B. D., Rev. Mr. Robinson, Assistant District Secretary, Rev. H. B. Boyver of Halifax, former District Secretary, Mr. A. M. Denevick, K. C., of Toronto.

The Bible Society work in connection with the Sunday School has been again under the competent charge of Miss C. M. Haslam. No activity of the society is of more importance and none has within it more promise of an increased intelligent and vital interest in the Word of God.

Regret was expressed at the resignation of the Treasurer, Mr. R. B. Towriss. The committee has been fortunate in securing Dr. H. D. Johnson as his successor.

Attention is called to, and commendation expressed of the matter of the membership as set forth in the Treasurer's Report. It was suggested that every church and Sunday School in the province should be a life member. The receipt of several legacies, also received commendatory notice, and gratitude was expressed at the splendid cooperation of the auxiliaries.

After expressing appreciation of the good service of the Depository, Mr. Carter, Mr. Gordon concluded his report as follows:
"May we then, inspired by the splendid history of the past, emulating the efforts of the workers who have nobly done their task, and gratefully trusting in the guidance of Almighty God, ever supplicate and commend this worthy cause in its striving toward the answer of the Master's Prayer 'Thy Kingdom Come'."

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPT.

Miss C. M. Haslam, Secretary of the Sunday School Department in the course of her report said:
"Though this Department was nominally closed in November, 1923, considerable correspondence was carried on during the winter following and particularly during the spring. Schools which had not completed their Memory Work unit after the beginning of the year asked for awards while other schools whose Superintendents felt that better results from memorizing could be obtained during the more leisureed months of winter asked for copies of syllabus. Our schools wrote sending contributions to the work."

In May all schools were notified of the beginning of a new season of work and copies of the 1923 syllabus were sent to all desiring them, for very few, if any had completed this course of five hundred verses. Up to the end of June over eighty schools were heard from, seventy-five of which asked
