A Fine Tribute To Island Poet

The Boston Evening Transcript in its literary section, gives the following very complimentary review of "Poems from the Front," by Bombarrier Edgar W. McInnis, of this city:

"Such is the ease with this little volume by Bomber McInnis. He is evidently not a poet by profession; his thoughts are largely fitted to rhymes made by other men.

"The little volume is so charmingly frank; the boy's conception of the need of making jokes of one's surroundings to reveal the stiff upper lip, as in 'Our Dug-out,' sometimes resulting in something as mediocre as 'Quarantine Camp,' or 'Back into Civics Again,' his unashamed faith in the good God, as in 'Rouge Croix'; his defiant patriotism, echoing everywhere, especially in 'The Love of the Sons,' with its ringing chorus of 'England, Mother, our love is shown!'

EAST ANTRIM GOES AGAINST CARSON

LONDON, June 13.—In the Parliamentary election held today for the vacant seat in East Antrim, Ireland, the defeat of the regular Unionist incumbent, headed by Sir Edward Carson, resulted.

The victor was Mr. Hanna, Independent Unionist, who polled 8,714 votes, as against 7,539 for Mr. Moore, Unionist, and 1,778 for Mr. Legg, Liberal.

The workmen largely supported Mr. Hanna, Friends of Sir Edward Carson had announced that he would resign the leadership of the Unionist party unless Mr. Moore was elected.

In the last Parliamentary election of the eastern division of Antrim, Brig. Gen. R. C. A. MacCallum, Unionist, polled 15,206 votes, as compared with 861 votes for D. Dunigan, the Sinn Fein Candidate. Gen. MacCallum and Mr. Dunigan were the only candidates.
