—Misses Margaret and Laura Rix, who have completed their studies at C. B. College, Charlottetown, left on Saturday morning for Boston.

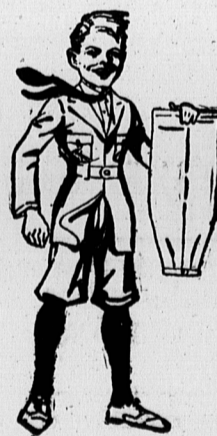
