NO. 5 SIEGE ARTILLERY DRAFT NOW INFANTRY

By letters received in this City from England it is learned that No. 5 Siege Artillery which left here a short time ago has been transferred to the 26th Reserve Battalion of Infantry. Corporal W. P. McKenna writing to a friend here under date of May 19th says: It may interest you to know that No. 5 Siege Artillery Draft has been turned into an Infantry Draft and will shortly enter upon a course of bayonet fighting, rifle shooting and trench warfare. This transfer caused great surprise amongst the members of the Draft as it was distinctly understood that we were to reinforce the 5th Siege Battery. The command came last night and our handbags and spurs were handed over to the Quartermaster's stores this morning. The rest of the clothing and equipment will be disposed of tomorrow.

In a letter, (May 25) he says: As advised in my last letter that we were preparing to break camp at

Otterpool, today finds us in the above full fledged infantry men in every respect. All that is necessary is a little training to make the feathers show.

Lieut. Davison and McLean are not attached to this battalion, although in the same camp. At present they are in London having gone there yesterday on business, said business I believe to be connected with our conversion. Our draft numbers only 30 men, the following having been quarantined at Otterpool Camp. Bdr. Duncan, R. S. Bdr. McLean, A. H. Gr. McLean, D. S. Gr. Conroy, C. S. Gr. Johnston, A. Gr. Johnston, E. W. HORSES STOLEN TO MAKE SAUSAGES.

LONDON, Eng.—Disclosures regarding the manufacture of horse sausage, said the traffic in horse flesh by Belgian butchers, were made in the course of a trial at the Old Bailey the other day of Wm. Wakefield, 26, carman, and William Dasher, 43, dealer who were indicted upon three charges of stealing horses, and vans and their contents in the North London. According to the case, for the prosecution, these proceedings, formed a sequel to a series of losses of valuable horses, in sound and healthy working condition, the suggestion being that they had been stolen for the express purpose of being slaughtered and dressed in the form of either of sausages or of joints. At stables in the occupation of Dasher at Brewery Road, Islington the police found seven horses' tongues, and several sets of harness, which it was alleged, has been taken there. Dasher, giving evidence admitted that his business had been that of buying up horses slaughtered, and selling the carcasses for sausage meat. Counsel: You have I believe, two kinds of customers for the meat? Yes; one takes the carcass without the

bone, the other with the bone. The one who takes the boneless meat has also the tongues. Are there two sorts of horse sausage? Yes, there is lean horse and fat, or "hanging up" horse sausage. What is "hanging up" horse? Horse that is cut up into joints. Evidence was called to support an alibi on behalf of Dasher the defence of the second prisoner being that he was merely a paid servant in charge of the stables. The jury found both men guilty. Henry William Phillips, 25, who pleaded guilty to stealing two horses the property of the London and South-Western Railway, was then brought up. Counsel said these van robberies had become so frequent of late that transport of goods had been seriously affected and the slaughtering of valuable horses in this way was a grave matter, as the animals could not easily be replaced at the present time. Inspector Neil proved convictions against each of the men who, he said, were the associates of a notorious gang of horse stealers. On an average six to eight horses at £80 to £90 apiece had been stolen weekly, slaughter, and the meat sold to Belgian butchers. Judge Rentoul said this was one of the worst crimes that could be committed at the present time, when horses were so much needed for the service of the country.

FINANCIAL AID FOR HER ALLIES

PARIS—France has thus far advanced to her allies or friendly states 3,875,000,000 francs. A bill was introduced in the Chamber, today by the minister of finance with the approval of President Poincare asking for authority to loan to France's allies and friends additional sums amounting to 2,138,000,000 francs. This would bring the total advances by France up to more than 6,000,000,000.
