A BOSTON writer in the Halifax Herald, says: As of late there has been a large influx of young girls from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island. The Mail correspondent had an interview with D. J. Lamond, proprietor of the Lamond employment bureau, at 46 Gray street, in reference to their chances of securing employment. He said that the number of girls coming from the provinces every year was increasing; but that wages were decreasing accordingly. What they call "green girls," can be had now for as low as a dollar or a dollar and a half a week. This pay is advanced after a time, of course, but nevertheless, the average provincial girl is working for a great deal less than she was five or six years ago. He said that Massachusetts was a little ground between the Irish and provincial girl, with an advantage in favor of the latter, of being more easily and more readily trained to do her work, and of being of more even temperament. At present, he said, the supply was not equal to the demand; wages did not seem to increase any. Provincial girls are always preferred by the best families of Boston and its vicinity.
