(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Nov. 27—Negotiations with a Government committee from the Agriculture and Finance Departments are proceeding, R. J. Leslie of Kentville, N.S., said today but he declined to elaborate on progress of a delegation representing Annapolis Valley apple growers in seeking financial assistance for their apple crop failure. They were appointed by the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association.
